STOCKHOLDER OF FORD PLANT WINS U. S. TAX ACTION

CINCINNATI, O., May 8.—The United States was made liable to a refund of approximately \$44,500, 000 to former owners of Ford motor stock as corporation income paid under protest, when the United States court of appeals today affirmed the United States district court at Detroit in the suit of Mrs. Alice G. Kales against the government.

Fred L. Woolworth, internal revenue collector at Detroit, had appealed from the district court decision, which held that Mrs. Kales, widow of a Detroit manufacturer, was entitled to recovery of \$2,627,509.95 which she had paid to the government under protest.

Charles Evans Hughes, former secretary of state, represented Mrs. Kales in the district court trial and appeal.

In addition to Mrs. Kales' claim against the government, \$35,100, 000 was represented in the petition of seven other former holders of Ford stock as friends of the court.

Interest claimed by the eight plaintiffs amounts to \$6,790,000.

BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Del Bissone, first baseman of the Brooklyn Robins, hit for the circuit at St. Louis yesterday for the sixth time this year, placing him in a tie with Babe Ruth for joint major league leadership.

Del's homer was not enough, however, to prevent the Robins from bowing, 6 to 5, to the Cardinals in a hectic game.

Brooklyn's defeat enabled the fast-stepping Pittsburgh Pirates to climb into a tie for third place with the Robins, by virtue of their third straight victory over the Boston Braves at Forbes field, 9 to 4.

The New York Giants gained an even break by winning the last game of the series at Cincinnati, 5 to 1. Larry Benton allowed 10 hits but was extremely effective with men on the bases.

The Cubs made a clean sweep of the three game series with the Phillies by taking the final battle, 7 to 4, at Chicago. Bush struck out nine Phils.

Lefty Grove's fast ball sent nine men down on strikes as the Athletics crushed the Detroit Tigers at Philadelphia 10 to 0, for the third consecutive day.

At New York the Yankees made

it four in a row over the Chicago White Sox, 3 to 5. The Sox knocked Shealey out of the box in the seventh inning but could do little with George Pipgras.

The Cleveland Indians bunched hits off Harris in two innings to beat the Red Sox at Boston, 4 to 2. Three Washington pitchers could not stop a terrific offensive by the St. Louis Browns who over whelmed the Senators 15 to 2 at the national capital. The Browns made 17 hits, Manush getting four of them.

SCOVILLE PARTY TO END MEETING HERE TONIGHT

With the presentation of the world-famous Passion Play lecture in the First Christian church tonight by Dr. Charles Reuben Scoville, evangelist of international fame, the final curtain will be lowered on the revival crusade which sponsors say was the most successful ever held in Roseburg.

A concert of vocal and instrumental numbers by Mrs. Arlene Dux Scoville and Professor Isaac S. Farris will precede the lecture. Mrs. Scoville will sing several great concert numbers and Mr. Farris will play a number of selections from the great masters.

Tonight's entertainment is not an ordinary stereopticon lecture, but a unique pictorial story of a passing interest, in which Dr. Scoville, by the aid of a superb set of stereopticon slides will take his audience on a journey from New York across the stormy Atlantic to Paris, the most beautiful city in the world. From Paris the journey leads up the foothills of the German Alps to the historic little village of Oberammergau, where is enacted every ten years the most remarkable drama man ever witnessed.

During the lecture Dr. Scoville explains in detail the customs and habits of the inhabitants of Egypt, India and Palestine concluding the lecture with 120 views of the last week of the Saviour's life on earth.

A splendid audience greeted Dr. Scoville and members of his party last night when the final gospel service was held. Five new converts being reached, making a total of 102 additions to the local congregations during the revival period.

The evangelistic party will stop off at Klamath Falls for an evening's entertainment on their way to Modesto, California, where they will conduct their next campaign.

CALVERT SUCCEEDS PIPER

PORTLAND, Ore., May 8.—R. G. Calvert, who for years was assistant to Edgar B. Piper, has been made managing editor of the Oregonian. Horace E. Thomas becomes executive news editor, and John L. Travis, who has been assistant city editor, is advanced to city editor.

Announcement of these changes, resulting from the death last week of Mr. Piper, was made in today's Oregonian by O. L. Price, manager.

GOLF TOURNEY'S SMALLEST ENTRANT PROVIDES THRILL

SANDWICH, Eng., May 8.—José Jurado, of Argentine, lightweight contestant for British golf honors, turned in a sterling 69 to take the lead in the second qualifying round of the open championship today. Jurado scored 25 yesterday and his aggregate of 144 placed him three strokes under the 147 to H. H. Jolly, compiled earlier for the two-day play.

The little, little South American provided the biggest thrill of the two days' play when he whaled his ball through the wind over all obstacles to the greens where he was putting for birdies at nearly every hole. He scored his 69 by sending a 12 foot putt, spinning home on the home hole for a birdie three. He was out in 35 and home in 34.

Jurado's 69 equals the professional records of Royal St. George's.

The 25 year old Argentine is the smallest man in the championship. He scales no more than 135 pounds, but today he drove tremendous distances and sent most of his second shots to the greens within striking distance of the cups.

American professionals seem safe in the qualifying fold except Larry Nabholz and Bob Stuppig. Nabholz took 84 today and can not hope to remain in the competition. The Chicago pro with a total of 161 has a bare chance.

Bill Melhorn who led the field yesterday over the Royal St. George with 72 found Prince's ten strokes harder and needed \$2 today but his aggregate of 154 is quite safe.

Gene Sarazen took 77 yesterday and 75 today for a safe total of 152.

RAND QUIZ COMMITTEE WORKING ON VERDICT
