CALIFORNIA PRUNE MEN TO TRY LOCAL PLAN

SAN JOSE, Calif., May 10.—Reorganization of the California Prune and Apricot Growers Association along radically different lines was approved at the annual meeting of the association here yesterday. In the adoption of the recommendations of the reorganization committee appointed six months ago. This action was taken at a joint meeting of the voting board and the membership of the association.

The new plan calls for the complete decentralization of the association through the formation of local units to have complete control of the handling and packing of crops in their own local plants. The central organization, under the plan, will be concerned only with the marketing of the crop. Under the plan members will have the privilege of withdrawing at stated periods each year.

MRS. OGDEN ARMOUR PAYS HUSBAND'S DEBTS

CHICAGO, May 10.—Claims against the estate of the late J. O. Ogden Armour, Chicago packer who once said he had lost a million dollars a day for more than 100 days during the World War, including his debt to Armour & Co., Chicago packers, and claims of bond holders of the Sutter Basin company, a contract land reclamation project, were wiped off the books last night in a transaction which involved cash and bonds to the value of approximately \$18,000,000.

"The books have been wiped clean and everyone treated justly," said Alexander F. Reichmann, attorney for Mrs. Armour.

Mrs. Armour has taken every possible step to see to it that her husband's debts were settled to the satisfaction of all his creditors.

JURADO BACK IN LEAD IN BRITISH GOLF TOURNEY

SANDWICH, Eng., May 10.—Jose Jurado, who led the qualifying field in the British open golf championship, led again at the half way point by scoring 71 today for a 36-hole total of 145.

In a tie for second place, three strokes back were Gene Sarazen and Walter Hagen, and Bill Melhorn another American pro was tied with Archie Compston low British entry for fourth place with scores of 149.

Thirty-six holes tomorrow all contestants 15 or more strokes behind the leader dropped. Three from the United States Tommy Armour and Bob Stupples, pros, and Johnny McHugh, amateur were casualties, Armour taking 161, McHugh 163 and Stupples 167. Two rounds will be played tomorrow to decide the title.
