Called Meeting of B. and P. W. Club Held to Discuss Convention

A called meeting of the Roseburg Business and Professional Women's Club was held last evening at the club rooms of the Roseburg Woman's Club. Reports from the chairmen of the various committees which are arranging for the state convention here next week were heard. Songs for the convention were practiced by the members. A meeting of the delegates and alternates is called for next Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Systematic work along vocational guidance lines for a group of 50,000 business and professional women will shortly be launched by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

A comprehensive occupational survey of the women of the federation which has been in progress during the past two years under the direction of the School of Business Administration of the University of Michigan is well on its way to completion. The data obtained from this survey will be placed in the hands of an educational secretary retained by the national federation, and will be the means of launching a vocational guidance program on a larger scale than has in all probability ever been attempted before.

In addition to this general survey the 366 local clubs throughout the federation are this year engaged in making a local survey of vocational guidance facilities. The results of these surveys will be tabulated at the headquarters of the organization and the federation will then set about in businesslike fashion to attack the problem of business women who is a misfit.

DEMOCRATS WIN FIRST TEST ON TAX SLASH BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12.—Senate democrats upset the republican \$200,000,000 tax reduction plan in the first major test today, restoring to the revenue bill the house provision for a graduated scale of lower tax rates on corporations with incomes of \$15,000 and less.

The vote on this proposal, advanced by Senator Simmons, democrat, North Carolina, was 40 to 38. Democrats voted solidly for it while two republicans—Norbeck and McMaster, of South Dakota—bolstered their party ranks and turned the tide.

The provision will add \$27,000,000 to the 200,000,000 total reduction allowed under the republican bill.

The rates under the provision are five per cent on corporation incomes of \$7,000 and less, 7 per cent on incomes between \$7,000 and \$12,000 and nine per cent on
