DODGE SHIPMENTS SHOW 30 PER CENT GAIN ABOVE 1927

It is urged that residents make a special effort to have their yards look as attractive as possible during the coming month. Beautiful yards, with an abundance of flowers, always gives a fine appearance to a city and is one of the first things to be noticed by visitors. Well kept lawns and gardens are indications of a progressive city, and even though the majority of places may be maintained attractively yet one or two poorly kept places in a block can detract from the entire section.

Another thing that is being suggested is that all business houses make it a point to keep choice flowers conspicuously displayed during the remainder of the month. A bowl of roses, peonies, sweet peas or other flowers in a show window and a bouquet on a counter to the place of business and will unquestionably attract the attention of the visitors. It is also urged that residents be liberal with their flowers and that the visitors be allowed to have all the flowers that they desire for their own use.

HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics, O. A. C.)

Growing children's clothes can be lengthened easily if the hem is sewed in with a chain stitch. A regular chain stitch machine is not obtainable, a running stitch is good, either may be taken out quickly and a new hem put in the garment.

Elastic in children's clothes wears much longer if a hook and eye are sewed on at either end, because it can then be removed easily while the garment is being laundered. This keeps it from the hard wear of laundering.

A thimble on the end of curtain rods which are being put into freshly laundered curtains, prevents tearing of casing by ragged edges.

Time is saved in cutting patterns if a paper weight is laid on the pattern in place of pinning it to the material.

The bias seams on a skirt will not stretch if one starts at the bottom of the garment and sews up.

An easy way to cut bias is to fold a square of material to form a triangle. Next fold the point opposite the longest side down to it. Repeat, mark strips the desired width and cut.

In pressing seams in fabrics that mark easily, strips of paper slipped under the seam edges prevent the seam's width from showing on the right side.

The original outlines of a commercial pattern may be kept if alterations are made inside the pattern, rather than on the edges.

Fancy place cards are not considered good taste except for holidays and special occasions. For formal functions plain white cards are placed on the napkins at the left of the cover.

GERMAN STATESMAN IS SERIOUSLY ILL

BERLIN, May 15.—Dr. Gustav Stresemann, foreign minister, was confined to his bed today seriously ill. All his scheduled election speeches have been cancelled.

Dr. Stresemann's ailment is described as feverish paratyphoid, like stomach or intestinal catarrh, complicated by an affection of the kidneys demanding extreme care and strict confinement to his bed.

Although Dr. Stresemann succeeded in overcoming a crisis yesterday his condition is still serious. His physicians say that he will be confined to his bed for at least three weeks after which a long vacation is imperative. The foreign minister's duties will be taken over shortly by Dr. von Schubert of the foreign office.

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NEW OFFICERS ARE DETAILED FOR THE OREGON MILITIA

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—Major Cyril A. Dawson, of Fort Leavenworth, has been recommended by the war department as successor to Major Carr Waller, instructor for the coast artillery, who leaves for Fort Winfield Scott after the summer encampment. It is announced at the office of Adjutant General George A. White.

Orders have been received at the office for the transfer of Captain Vincent Diaz, instructor in infantry, to report at Fort Howard, Md., where he will join his old regiment, the 12th infantry. Capt. Diaz will be replaced by Capt. Alexander McGee, now attending infantry school on the east coast.

Both transfers are in line with the general policy of the war department in shifting instructors about the country. Both officers have been with the Oregon National Guard for the past five years.

HOOVER'S LEADER SEES FARMER O. K. IN INDIANA VOTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 15.—The debate over Secretary Hoover's strength as a presidential candidate among the farmers was carried along today by James W. Good, directing head of his campaign, who declared that an examination of the Indiana primary returns shows the commerce secretary "carried a number of agricultural counties" in the state, and in some farming townships ran up a vote of more than two to one.

"The failure of Secretary Hoover to carry more of the agricultural counties," Good said, "is due only to the fact that in the rural districts it is more difficult to complete a good political organization. Secretary Hoover not only had to overcome the personal popularity of Senator Watson, but the support of his candidacy aided by the whole field of opposition candidates."

The Indiana result clearly shows that Secretary Hoover has great strength in agricultural sections as has previously been proved in agricultural states such as Maine, Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky, Oregon, Washington, Utah and others.

THEODORE ABRAHAM APPOINTED INTERNE IN N. Y. HOSPITAL

Theodore Abraham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Abraham of this city, yesterday received notification by telegram that he had been accepted as an interne in the Presbyterian hospital of New York City. The appointment as interne in the Presbyterian hospital is a coveted honor as this hospital is one of the largest in New York City. Mr. Abraham is a Roseburg boy and received early schooling in this city. His many friends here are greatly pleased to learn of his advancement.

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STATE MAY RENT PRIVATE BUILDING

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—If the city council of Salem grants the permit, which it doubtless will, a building will be erected by private capital on 14th street, immediately east of the state supreme court building, to house the state printing department and some state offices.

The city planning commission

last night voted to recommend the proposal to the council. The building will be constructed by D. B. Jarman and Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner. It will cost about \$50,000.

NORTHERN CHINA ARMY PREPARES TO MEET NATIONALS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

SHANGHAI, May 15.—The national news agency today said that Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, northern dictator, had left Peking in an armored train, arriving at Tientsin on Sunday. The same source stated that the northern forces were preparing defense works at Shan-kaiwan at the coast end of the great wall.

Telegraphic communication with North China was still interrupted, messages from Peking coming belatedly through Mukden, Manchuria.

Americans, who took refuge in Tientsin when Japanese and Chinese clashed with heavy casualties in Tientsin, were planning today to return there since the Japanese have restored order.

TSINGTAO, China, May 15.—Three companies of Japanese infantry which were sent from Tientsin to Tsingtao on March 20 arrived here from Tientsin today and were immediately embarked aboard a Japanese destroyer to return to Tientsin because of the tense situation there.

VOTING MACHINE CASE MUST WAIT TILL AFTER 18TH

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—The Portland voting-machine case, in which L. B. Sandblast demands, through mandamus action, to compel County Clerk Beveridge to discard voting machines that have been installed in 70 Multnomah county precincts, will not get a hearing in the supreme court before the primary election of next Friday.

The court yesterday declined to issue an alternative writ because of lack of time before the election, and also because there would not be present this week a quorum of the justices to hear the case. It was pointed out that it would be impossible by Friday to give the defense time to answer, for the court to hear arguments, render a decision, and allow the county clerk time to arrange for the election.

Sandblast contends that use of the machines deprives him of the right to use his slogan, which demands a revision of the liquor law.
