The project which would also carry annual expenditure of \$15,000 for maintenance will be included in the rivers and harbors bill which the committee is framing.

COOLIDGE PLEADS FOR MORE ART IN LIFE OF AMERICA

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 16.—A plea for more art and beauty in the daily life of the American people in order that their "moral standards" might be raised was made here today by President Coolidge.

"It is especially the practical side of art that requires more emphasis," Mr. Coolidge said in an address opening a joint meeting of the American Federation of Arts and American Museums.

"We need to put more effort in translating art into the daily life of the people," he added. "If we could surround ourselves with forms of beauty, the evil things of life would tend to disappear, and our moral standards would improve. Through our contact with the beautiful we see more of the truth and are brought into closer contact with the infinite."

"Our country has reached a point where this is no longer a visionary desire but is becoming an actual reality. With general prosperity, with high wages, with reasonable hours of labor, has come both the means and the time to cultivate an artistic spirit."

"Philanthropy has given the people access to all that is most beautiful in form and color. It is theirs without money and without price, if they will but go and possess it. Out of our agriculture, our commerce, and our industry we can see already emerging a new spirit. The potential is becoming actual."
