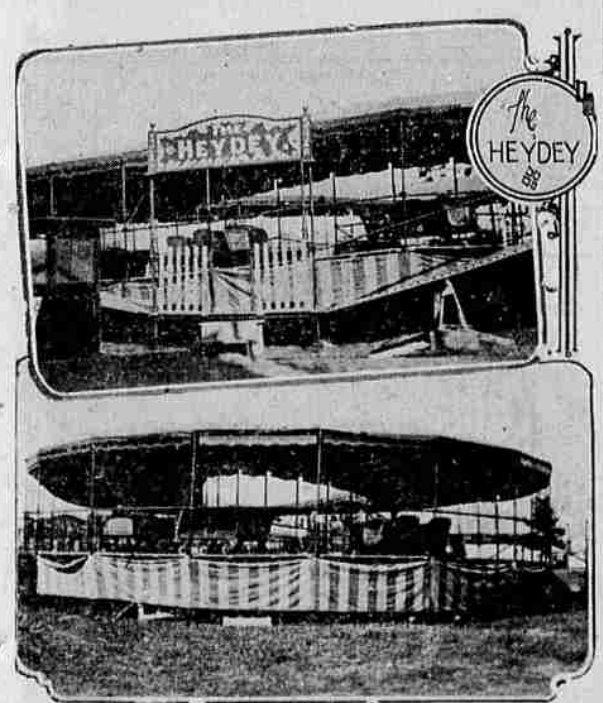

VERDICT COMPELS WOOL BUYERS TO STAND LOSS

PENDLETON, Ore., May 17.—A jury in federal court here today returned a verdict for Sid Seale, Condon wool grower in a case brought by the Eastworth-Stevenson company of Boston, wool brokers. The wool concern sought to collect \$1,000 alleged to be due them on a difference in the value of wool sold them by Seale in 1920. Seale was advanced 20c a pound on the wool and the brokers sold for 15c, claiming shrinkage and sand caused the lowering of the price.

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DICE THROW NAMES NEW GANG LEADER. THEN HE'S SLAIN

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, May 17.—The roll of a pair of dice won Edmund McGuire, 26 years old, leadership of a Brooklyn waterfront gang, but cost him his life.

A few minutes after he had been "elected" by rolling a "lucky seven" several shots rang out and a pier watchman found McGuire dead with three bullets in his body. Survivors of the once powerful "Wild Bill" Lovett's gang had gathered at the pier to revive the gang which had deteriorated since the slaying of "Wild Bill" four years ago. There was a time when a longshoreman along the Brooklyn waterfront could not leave a bit of cargo without paying tribute to "Wild Bill's" gang.

Each of the six believed he was qualified to command what was left of the gang and a pair of dice finally was decided upon as the ballot to decide the election.

Police said there had been at least 15 slayings among members of the gang since the death of "Wild Bill."
