Two Roseburg Musicians Appeared Tuesday Eve in Unusual Recital

A recital of more than ordinary merit was given at the South Methodist church Tuesday evening by Miss Gladys Strong, pianist, and Mrs. Chas. A. Brand, voice. The church was completely filled by an audience comprising the best musical people of Roseburg, who showed their appreciation of the excellent program by frequent applause. Each number rendered by these artists was of so great merit that it is difficult to select those showing the most excellence.

The opening number, Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata," in three movements, rendered by Miss Strong was given with an appreciation of the composers though rarely heard in a city of this size. It would have attracted attention in much larger circles. Perhaps Chopin's "Herceuse" with its delicate and delightful shading and exquisite harmonies was outstanding in a program, every number of which was worthy of special mention. The audience demanded frequent encores for both artists, who responded graciously.

Mrs. Brand sang ten numbers, "Rose Softly Blooming," by Spohr was given an ovation by the audience which seemed to appreciate the rendering given this song gem by the artist. The Cavatina from Gounod's "Queen of Sheba," was exquisitely rendered by Mrs. Brand. The varying emotions of the love sick queen as she hesitates between her duty to King Solomon, her betrothed, and the gallant warrior to whom she has given her heart, gave an excellent opportunity for delicate shading which the singer expressed admirably.

It is rare that an audience, at the close of a program of some length, demands an encore after the last song but the strains of the lovely voice of the singer were too much appreciated by the audience to allow her to depart after the last song on the program so she was recalled and gave "Fiddle and I," with Miss Naomi Scott rendering a violin obligato in her usual artistic manner.

The recital was greatly aided by the spoken introductions of the musicians who outlined the idea of the composition about to be rendered.
