SINNOTT TELLS NEED OF NORTH UMPQUA ROAD

Completion Twenty-Two Mile Gap, Big Camas to Steamboat, Urged

FOREST IS REASON

Roseburg Pointed Out Only Natural Approach for Prompt Action in Case of Fire

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—Full explanation of the need for a 22-mile link of road in Umpqua national forest, connecting Steamboat bridge and Big Camas on the North Umpqua river, is made for the benefit of congress by Representative Sinnott, chairman of the public lands committee, in his favorable report on the bill of his colleague, Representative Hawley, providing for construction of the road by the government out of a special appropriation.

"It will serve two purposes," says Mr. Sinnott's report, "it will enable the forest officials to get promptly on the ground when fires occur with apparatus for fighting them. The eastern end of Douglas county contains 60,000,000,000 board feet of standing mature timber, of which a very large proportion belongs to the government. The Umpqua national forest contains 834,663 acres, and some of the finest timber in the Pacific northwest."

Protection Inadequate
"The forest on the North Umpqua river is very inadequately provided with means for its protection. Fires are started mainly by lightning, which may start several fires at once, considerable distances apart. Owing to the fact that the timber is ripe, the area heavily forested with undergrowth that burns readily, fires develop and spread rapidly. From ground fires to crown fires and burn with great ferocity. They are fought by rushing men with axes, shovels, pikes, etc., to the scene, and time is the important element. A young fire may be rather quickly hemmed in, but a fire that has obtained headway will cause great loss and destruction before it can be controlled."

FUNERAL GARDEN VALLEY MAN HELD ROSEBURG SUNDAY

The funeral of Richard Ewens, of Garden Valley, was held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Roseburg Undertaking Parlors, Rev. Joseph Knotts, pastor of the M. E. church of Roseburg, officiating. The interment was in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Ewens was born in June, 1850, near Ottawa, Canada. He was in his 78th year at the time of his death. While still a young boy he came with his father, James Ewens, and other members of the family, and settled in the district around Georgian Bay, Canada. In 1865 he moved to the northwest part of the province of Saskatchewan and later went to Saskatoon. In 1920 he arrived in Roseburg, his family following the following year.

Although he was a resident of Douglas county for only a short time, he made a host of friends who will grieve to learn of his death. He leaves a widow and two sons, Harvey E. and F. Graham, of Garden Valley, and a daughter, Mrs. J. B. Boyd of Joydminister, Saskatchewan, Canada, also two brothers, John Ewens of Toronto and Will Ewens of Owen Sound, Ontario.
