## EXTENSION OF STREET LIGHTING SYSTEM PLANNED

Extension of the city's street lighting system in three directions is now under consideration by the council. The committee on electric lights is making an investigation of costs in order that it may be determined whether or not available funds are sufficient for the improvement.

The residents of Stephens street have asked for the extension of the system south to the Rose hotel, while it is also proposed to continue the lights north across the new Deer Creek bridge to the Crenshaw building.

At last night's meeting of the council there was a petition presented from the Christian church asking for a light in front of the new building there, and the council felt that as long as the lighting system on the main streets is being extended that it might be well to run the circuit up Douglas street and put lights in front of the new church building and the court house. The county court may be requested to help in extending this loop. The proposed extension would add about 12 lights to the system, together with four shorter lights on the Deer Creek bridge, making 16 in all.

The city has sufficient cable on hand to make the extensions, and would only have to purchase the poles and fixtures. The cost of installation would probably be the chief item of expense.

## AUTO STAGE LINES IN UNITED STATES ARE CONSOLIDATED

NEW YORK, May 22.—Consolidation of a group of automobile stage lines into the American Motor Transportation company, operating a national system with transcontinental service, was made known today. The new company is formed around the California Transit company, with W. E. Travis as president. The California company has a controlling interest in the holding company which has been formed to take over operating rights and facilities of established motor stage routes in several eastern and middle western states.

Transcontinental auto stage service has been operated between Los Angeles and New York for more than a month under traffic arrangements of various companies. The new company brings them under one management. The Pacific Coast System maintains daily service between cities from Portland, Ore., to Los Angeles and the Transcontinental system, connecting with the Pacific system at Los Angeles, extends to Denver, Omaha, Chicago, Detroit, Kansas City, St. Joseph, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and New York.

Financing for the new company consists of an offering today of 20,000 shares of class "A" preferred stock, convertible into common on the basis of 11 shares for each share of preferred.

## WEST COAST AIR TRANSPORT PLANES TO LAND FRIDAY

Leo G. Devaney, former Roseburg resident, now located at Portland, where he holds the position of chief pilot for the West Coast Air Transport company, was in Roseburg over Sunday making an inspection of the local airport. Mr. Devaney made several suggestions for improvements in the temporary runways to accommodate the large passenger ships of the West Coast line which are preparing to make regular stops at the local field.

The local American Legion post which has financed the temporary improvements is employing a crew today to carry out the suggestions made by Pilot Devaney and will have the field in shape tonight to meet all requirements of the company.

Mr. Devaney states that one of the planes will fly low over the field tomorrow, so that the pilot may become acquainted with the approaches, and that the first ship will land Friday morning on the trip from Portland to San Francisco.

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## BOY SCOUT CAMP DATES ARE SET

The boy scout camps for this council, consisting of Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, have been set up differently from last year in that the Three Sisters camp comes in August instead of in June. This for the reason that the season has not been advanced enough in the Three Sisters area for the best type of camping. The Wolf Creek camp which is located thirty miles east of Roseburg on Little River, begins July 2 and ends Monday morning, July 16th. The Elk River camp, located on Elk River twenty-five miles south of Bandon, begins Sunday, July 22, and ends Sunday, August 5. The Three Sisters Camp begins August 9 and ends Wednesday, August 22.

The same persons as that of last year have again been secured for this year's work. Maynard Bell and Stanley Kidder, both of whom are expert Senior Red Cross life savers, will serve as assistants to the director, and Mrs. Taylor, who has served so well as chef during the past two years, will again be behind the flap-jack flapper this year.

Moving pictures were taken of the activities last year and will again be taken this year. It is planned to pipe water from above the Wolf Creek site and create a larger area for camping.

The cost for camping this year will be the same excepting that on the Three Sisters camp the boys will pay the regular ten dollar fee and all food will be supplied there. However, they will cook for themselves on this camp as before. Pamphlets giving all the details have been prepared and furnished each scoutmaster for distribution to the scouts. The Wolf Creek and Elk River camps are limited to forty scouts and the Three Sisters camp to twenty-five. Registrations for Wolf Creek camp must be in by June 15th, for Elk River by June 20 and for the Three Sisters by July 15th.

## INJUNCTION BARS FLOWERS, SWEETS FROM MAN TO WIFE

CHICAGO, May 22.—The flowers that bloom in the spring, trails, have plenty to do with the case of Johnson vs. Johnson in which Judge Sabath today had interested himself.

Judge Sabath last week issued an injunction which in effect prohibited James Barrett Johnson from sending flowers to his wife, Ruth. Johnson, protesting that no man should be deprived of the privilege of sending his wife a little gift of roses, has asked that the injunction be set aside.

"I didn't realize that I had issued an injunction of this sort," the court said yesterday, in granting a day's continuance in the injunction matter. "I certainly did not intend to prohibit a husband from sending his wife flowers or candy, or from trying to win her back."

"Can I go over to her house tonight and ring the bell and just talk to her?" Johnson inquired.

"No," replied the court. "You can't force love. It must be won through kindness or heroism."

"I want Mrs. Johnson to come into court and tell me just what she doesn't like about a man who tries so hard to be good to her that he gets into difficulties. I want to talk to both of you and see if this can't be fixed."

Judge Sabath, besides being the author of a play on divorce, has heard 25,000 divorce cases and effected 1,500 reconciliations.

## PYLE MARATHONERS 5 DAYS FROM GOAL

DEPOSIT, N. Y., May 22.—A fifty mile jaunt to Liberty, N. Y., was today's program for N. C. Pyle's transcontinental foot racers, now only five days away from New York City and the end of their 3500 mile trek.

Andy Payne, the Claremore, Okla. youth, found his lead over John Salo of Passaic, N. J., cut to little more than 15 hours. Salo, grimly determined to race Payne off his feet, led the pack in yesterday's 74.6 mile lap from Waverly, N. J. It was the longest single day N. J. it was the longest single day of the derby. Salo covered the distance in 12 hours, 13 minutes, nine seconds, bringing his elapsed time for 3,230.3 miles from Los Angeles to 553:11:36. Payne and James Pollard, of Reno, Nev., were third in 13:36:43. Payne's elapsed time is 536:51:51, a lead of 15 hours, 19 minutes, 45 seconds over the Passaic Plan.

Frank von Flus of Kerman, Calif., was second in 13:00:14, despite the fact that he suffered slight contusions of the leg when he was struck by a hit and run motorist.

## STREET REPAIR DEVICE WILL BE GIVEN TRY-OUT

A test of a new machine for street repair work is to be made by the city street department through arrangements completed by the council last night. The machine is an oil fed heater which melts the surface of the pavement so that it may be raked and rolled. Many times pavement is cracked and broken without any of the material being displaced. Under the present system of repair it is necessary to dig out all of this pavement and replace it with new material.

The machine which the city proposes to buy will melt all of this material, heating it up so that it may be raked level and then rolled, with the addition of such new material as may be needed, the heat binding the new asphalt to the old, so that a permanent job results.

It is believed that this outfit will save a great deal of expense in making minor street repairs and the equipment is being secured for a trial before the purchase is made. As there is a great deal of repair work to be done, it is believed that the outfit, if it operates as advertised, will be a great saving.

It is needed particularly to improve streets that have become "wavy." These bumps may be ironed out by means of this device, giving a smoother pavement.
