MILLERS OPPOSE RATE THAT WOULD HURT FLOUR TRADE

SEATTLE, May 23.—Pacific Northwest flour millers presented testimony today at the Interstate Commerce commission grain rate hearing that they were opposed to an differential on flour which would give it a higher rate than on wheat.

R. D. Lytle of Tacoma, secretary and traffic manager of the Northwest millers' association, testified that such a schedule would mean that mills now engaged in exporting flour to the Orient would lose this trade, as the Orient would import wheat and do its own manufacturing.

Mr. Lytle argued against what he characterized as "discriminatory" interpretations of Interstate Commerce commission rules and also against the proposed increased rates on milled grain. He said that while millers were asking a different rate on cereals and grain they opposed any differential on flour.

He also declared that under present interpretations of the tariff mid-west millers were enjoying conditions refused the Pacific Northwest as they were granted "back hauls" on grain in transit, ranging from a few to several hundred miles whereas in the north-west a two and one half per cent transit charge was invoked on any back haul.

THE PREPARATION AND USE OF CODLING MOTH TRAPS

Codling moth traps are coming into use more and more each year as a means of keeping in touch with the hatching of the different broods. They are not a means of controlling the codling moth, but are often useful in determining about the time sprays should be applied. Several traps in an orchard should give the grower better information than he now has under present methods of guessing entirely on weather conditions.

The best bait has been found to be the dark heavy molasses ferments. Such molasses as Hrer Rabbit and Aunt Dinah, used as 1 part molasses to 10 or 20 parts of water have been found very successful. Lighter molasses do not give as good results. One yeast cake should be used to 10 gallons of the solution, in order to hasten fermentation. The preparation may be used as soon as made up but catch of moths will be higher if the solution ferments. The use of a 1 to 10 solution is possibly best; as the water evaporates, slightly more water can be added until the solution becomes weak; then more molasses can be added. It is well, however, to change the entire solution several times a year.

Containers for bait—Shallow granular pans 3 to 4 inches deep and 8 or 10 inches across will give a better catch than deeper or more narrow pans. Agate ware or granite ware is recommended in place of tin as it is not affected by acids.

A large catch will be found in the tops of the trees. An easy method of supporting the pans in the top of the trees is by the use of prop poles with an out-arm with screw eyelets in the end of the arm and close to where attached to the prop; then a fine wire or a heavy line cord or small rope may be used to lower and hoist the pan of bait. The prop should be made stationary in order that the pan will not wave about in the wind and spill the contents. A wire may be looped around the rim of the pan and three wires brought up, to which the wire or rope used in lowering and raising the pan may be attached.

It is difficult to tell the grower just when the spray should be applied in relation to the catch of moths, as this will vary with the number of moths in the orchard and weather conditions, but it does give the grower the knowledge as to when the moths are flying. There may be two or more peak flying periods in the first brood as the moths are developed or delayed in the pupa stage with warm or cold weather. In the second brood, when the weather is warm, the eggs will hatch in from 8 to 10 days; and eggs from the second brood will hatch from 6 to 8 days with the increased temperature, and sprays should be applied before the eggs hatch but as close as possible to the time of hatch; a little early is better than too late. The time required for codling moth eggs to hatch varies with the temperature.

It has been found that the moths do not fly, or rather deposit eggs, until the temperature has reached about 60 degrees at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, and at this temperature it takes from 16 to 18 days for the eggs to hatch; at 65 degrees, about 10 days; at 70 degrees, about 7 days, and at 85 degrees, 4 days.

The above information is given for the growers who wish to try out this method of determining when the codling moths are flying and depositing eggs, in order that they may more accurately determine the time to spray, but it must be remembered that weather conditions and the seriousness of the infestation of codling moths will naturally tend to cause a variation in the time that the arsenic spray should be applied.

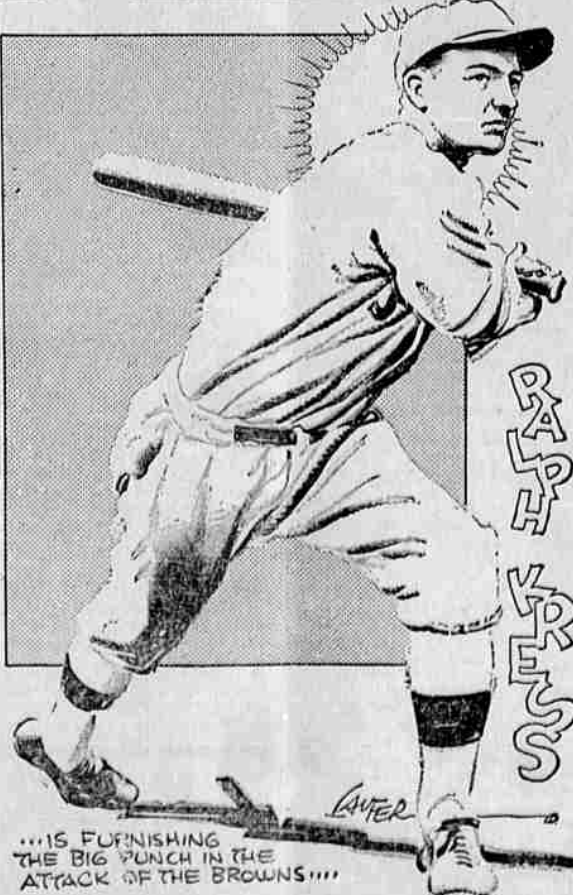
She's the Buddy Poppy Girl
