QUEEN'S FLOAT MOST BEAUTIFUL OF RECENT YEARS

Quite the most unusual and beautiful in detail is the Queen's float which appeared for the first time at the opening of the annual Strawberry Carnival this morning. Queen Marion, J. Gracie, the throne, and her attendants, Vera Houser, Mona Porter, Mildred Elliott and Rosina Porter, and the two little flower girls, Agnes Crawford and Ethel Kinney, made up the royal party on the float. Shading from delicate pink to deep exquisite rose color are the Hooper Beauty roses fashioned of crepe paper which have been combined with huckleberry vines as the principal decorative motif for the large float. Over 6,000 paper roses were made by the committee in charge of decoration to cover the frame. A very unusual idea in scrollwork was carried out to cover the sides of the float, the decoration extending in a wide scroll from the back of the car to a thin graceful line in front. The back of the float makes a graceful curve, filled with the darker roses and the inside of the float is lined with pink roses in paler shades. Placed in the middle and at the top is the royal throne, formed of silver cloth and high back, fashioned to form three points of silver.

The entire idea, originally carried out, evidences much forethought and work on the part of the committee which deserves high praise for the efforts expended on this unusual bit of work. Mrs. G. V. Wimberly and Mrs. J. A. Harding are joint chairmen and assisting on their committee were Mrs. W. E. Od, Mrs. Jack Wharton, Mrs. Geo. Wharton, Mrs. C. S. McKelhinny, Mrs. A. D. Abbott.

Public Utilities Stocks and Bonds Draw Fourth of U. S. Investments

NEW YORK, May 24.—More than one-fourth of the \$34,806,783, 000 invested in domestic and foreign securities by Americans the last five years went into the purchase of stocks and bonds of American public utilities.
During 1927 alone \$2,914,035, 000 was invested in utilities securities, surpassing by more than one-half million dollars the investments in the nearest competing group, in industrial corporations.
For the five year period investments in bonds and common and preferred stock were made as follows:
Utilities, \$9,044,855,000; Industrials, \$7,952,743,000; municipal bonds, \$6,548,447,000; foreign bonds, \$1,387,122,000; railroads, \$3,074,720,000; real estate, \$2,651,509,000; and farm loan bonds, \$1,077,755, 000.
The statistics, compiled from a survey directed by Bayard F. Pope, president of Stone & Webster and Blodgett, investment bankers, indicate further that only 2,122 issues, or less than six per cent of total \$6,955 issues available, were public securities.
In the study of bond investments it was noticed that investors generally sought to place their money in long-term issues of low coupon rates, tabulation of long and short maturities showing that \$2,476, 681,000 went into long term and only \$2,455,905,000 into short term bonds.
As regards returns, about one-third of the total investments, or \$9,588,581,000, went into 10,392 issues paying dividends of five and six percent. Twenty-seven percent was invested for returns of four to five percent, 26.5 percent for returns of six to seven percent and 9.6 percent for returns of more than seven percent. Only 2.8 percent was invested for returns of three to four percent.

Mismanagement Greatest Enemy Of Retailers, U. S. Bureau Head Says

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Mismanagement is the grim reaper which sends the "little fellow" of the business world to the morgue of commercial failures, an autopsy by the Department of Commerce disclosed.
Although 79 per cent of the nation's retail outlets are "small business establishments," many engaged in the same field, it is not competition that drowns accounts in red ink. Dr. M. Frank Surface, assistant director of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, contends.
The grocer who nurses a newborn business, feeding it his money and energy in the hope that some day it will repay him for his pains, usually may attribute his misfortune, if failure comes, to his own mismanagement. Perhaps he did not know that statisticians have discovered that it takes a minimum of 400 steady customers to support a grocery store. Perhaps he was not aware of some of the other first principles every retailer must learn before he achieves success.
"It is the little fellow who can profit from the assistance his government is able to give him," Dr. Surface says. "If he will use this department he can obtain the facts of his own business which will guide him from the dangers and pitfalls which have wrecked so many small businesses in the past. Let him learn his facts and he will avoid that menace of mismanagement which spells death."

BANK CASHIER SLAIN BY BANDITS; FATHER IS BADLY WOUNDED

LAMAR, Colo., May 23.—John Parrish, cashier of the First National Bank of Lamar, was shot to death, and his father, A. N. Parrish, was seriously wounded by four unknown robbers who looted the institution this afternoon and fled after kidnapping two tellers.
A posse led by Sheriff Leo Alderman started in pursuit and it was believed a running battle was imminent, as the posse caught sight of the robbers a short distance from Lamar. The robbers headed toward the Kansas line. The loot was small.

OKLAHOMAN LOOKS LIKE PYLE MARATHON VICTOR

MIDDELTOWN, N. Y., May 24.—Another 37 mile leg was in store for C. G. Pyle's transcontinental bicycle tour today taking them to Suffern, N. Y., only 10 days' run from the finish in Madison Square Garden. Tomorrow's lap will take them to Passaic, N. J., and Saturday will see them at the end of their long trek from Los Angeles to New York.
Andy Payne, Claremore, Okla., farm boy, who is firmly entrenched in the lead, increased his margin over John Salo of Passaic to 17 hours, 28 minutes, 7 seconds in yesterday's lap from Liberty, N. Y., to Middletown.
Ed Gardner, Seattle negro who holds eighth place, took the lead yesterday, finishing in 6:02:59, and gaining a firmer hold on his position.
Salo, held back by a chafed foot, came in eighteenth for the day in 9:27:03, nearly two hours behind Payne.

NEW YORK, May 24.—Mr. C. C. Price, in town ahead of his handlers, beat curriers to the question, "No," he said, "I am not broke. I'm \$100,000 behind, but there will be plenty of money to pay off the prize winners." He added that the race would cost \$250,000. Prize money will be \$48,000.
