IDAHO ASKS GRAIN RATE PARITY WITH TIDEWATER ZONE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
SEATTLE, May 24.—Idaho began its fight at the Interstate Commerce commission hearing today for freight rates that would place Idaho grain "on a parity" with other grain being shipped to tidewater ports.

Sam Newton, Idaho state expert, representing grain growers of Idaho, went on the stand today and submitted a vast number of exhibits in an effort to prove that Idaho was being discriminated against. The expert asked for rates from Idaho that would place grain in Seattle, Tacoma, Portland or Longview on an equal basis with other grain.

Exhibits showing that on the distance scale Idaho growers were paying a higher rate than growers in other states to tidewater were introduced by Newton. He demanded a general leveling of rates in the distance scale. Asked whether he favored the 10 per cent differential on grain shipped to Portland, he declared:

"Idaho wants the Portland differential if this is to be sustained. Idaho wants an open market which will place it on a parity with other grain producing sections of the Pacific Northwest."

"We are not interested in any struggle between Puget Sound and Portland, but we are interested in being permitted to ship our grain to any tidewater market in competition with other grain growing territory."

The Idaho case was expected to take the remainder of the day.

WILKINS AND EISELEN HONORED BY NORWAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
OSLO, Norway, May 24.—Captain George Wilkins and Lieutenant Carl B. Eielson, his companion on their flight across the Polar region from Alaska to Spitzbergen, were warmly welcomed today when they arrived at Oslo from the city of Bergen. The explorers were received by the authorities, the presidents of the Aero club and the Geographical society and by a representative of the American legation. The streets through which the fliers drove were crowded with cheering spectators.

Both motored to Scarskog, the home of Roald Amundsen outside of Oslo, where a reception was held in their honor.

While the reception was in progress, three naval planes circled over Amundsen's home. As the head of the newly founded Norwegian aero club, Amundsen decorated Wilkins and Eielson with the fliers' gold medals, eulogizing them as "two of the greatest fliers of our time." They had flown over more unknown territory than any other airmen, he said.

BARBERS KEEP NAME

PORTLAND, May 24.—The Oregon State Barber association, in annual convention here, decided to stick to its name. While the modern appellation "Chirotonor" appealed to the members as poetic, they thought it was too complex for handy use around the shop. Governor I. L. Patterson, ad-

ressing the convention banquet last night, congratulated the barbers on their move to boost the state by means of literature passed out at various shops.

DR. N. M. BUTLER OUT FOR LOWDEN

NEW YORK, May 24.—The Evening Post today says that Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, in declaring today flatly in favor of Frank O. Lowden, for the republican nomination for the presidency, made an indirect announcement of his own willingness to run for vice-president as the mate of the former governor of Illinois.

The newspaper says that the announcement makes it certain that the New York state delegation will split three ways on the first ballot at the Kansas City convention, with President Coolidge and Secretary Hoover getting the majority.
