A moth is flying up and down the aisle and my Hebrew friend is snapping his knobby at it in a vicious manner. There—the moth bit the meat!

We're right on top of it now. I can see the words like six-point type, shining from the top of the Standard Oil sign. And there is the bridge and the road to Corvallis. We're flying rather low now and I can see folks run out into the middle of the street and peer skyward. What's so funny about us?

But again we lose a city. Hardly had I punched that last period and gazed down until the city was lost from view.

On and on we go, I am now looking ahead in the compartment which houses the pilots. We have two of 'em and they're snatching and laughing at each other. Must think we have parachutes strapped on our backs. Meet the boys, Lt. H. B. Loughlin and Lt. L. C. Goldsmith. They are sort of bashful folks. But then, you must remember—no is Lindbergh!

Feel much safer now!

Three fellows up front certainly know how to handle the ship and we're quit biting our tongue.

Wait a minute, we just passed Harrisburg and the wristwatch clocked 9:45 a. m.

And there's Junction City! Help! We'll soon be home. Passed over Junction City at exactly 9:50.

Eugene must be next. Now we're slipping across some fertile valleys. Where is he? Is Eugene and by the way, where's the highway? Not in sight. Gosh, or you suppose we're lost!

The boys up front are still laughing and we'll bet their knees would go for White Bang.

Where's Eugene? Should be right around now, some place.

Just passed below and saw the hazy hills of Leona. Passed up Eugene! Service on right. An airport is a dark sight, more important than Espee shops.

Oh man! Look at the timber below. We must be in Douglas county sure enough. The most beautiful sight you ever laid your eyes on. The fog is lifting now and we are beginning to climb. We'd better climb or our landing gear will clip off the top of a tall pine.

BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

The first two battles of the American league's initial "crucial series" of the season finds the New York Yankees and the Philadelphia Athletics no better and no worse than they were before the opening shot was fired.

Before 41,000 cash customers and thousands of others who occupied points of vantage outside Shibe Park, the two leaders yesterday split even in the first two games of a six game series.

The champions pounded Robert Moses Grove, Connie Mack's star southpaw, hard and often to take the opener, 9 to 7, but Omeo Dr. well held the Yankees to six hits in the nightcap and the Athletics raced in to a five to two victory. Babe Ruth hit his fourteenth homer of the season.

Bob Fothergill's double with two men on base in the twelfth enabled the Detroit Tigers to score a six to four win over the White Sox at Chicago. Johnny Mossil, great six fly chaser, was knocked unconscious when a thrown ball struck him between the eyes. He expects to return to the lineup tomorrow.

The St. Louis Browns took a slugging game from the Indians at Cleveland, 12 to 9.

The St. Louis Cardinals pushed their way to within half a game of the National League lead by beating the Cincinnati Reds, 7 to 1, for their fourth straight victory.

Joe Patey, recently suspended for breaking training rules, returned to the Brooklyn mound and shut out the New York Giants with three hits, 3 to 0.

The Pirates gave the Chicago Cubs their fourth straight setback at Pittsburgh, 6 to 2.
