(Los Angeles sends this recipe)

Oysters fried in Crisco retain all their own delicate sea-tang. For

1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup ketchup
2 dozen oysters

1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cracker dust, or fine dried
bread crumbs

Mix flour and ketchup together, stir in milk slowly. Add salt. Drop
each oyster into this batter, then roll in cracker dust or bread crumbs.
Drop in deep kettle of hot Crisco 375° to 385° F. or when a small piece
of bread browns in 40 seconds. Fry until a rich brown, 2 or 3 minutes.
Serve very hot.

MINE DISASTER LEAVES
1,000 WITHOUT FATHERS

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MATHER, Pa., May 25.—Mather
mine has given up an additional
five dead to bring the total of re-
covered bodies to 168. The bodies
were found under a slate fall last
night. They were badly mutilated.
One body was identified as that
of David R. Jones, 61, who is said
to have been a star pitcher for the
old Louisville club when the Ken-

tucky city was in the National
league. A daughter, Louise Jones,
lives in Cleveland.

An unofficial Red Cross survey
was reported to have shown that
there are 1,000 fatherless children
in the town as a result of the mine
disaster.
