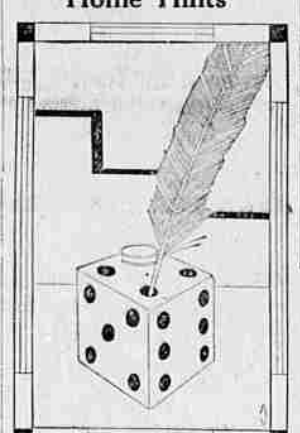
Mr. and Mrs. Singleton left on a honeymoon trip to points north and will return here to make their home.

A large Dice, with quill to match its red or green pips, serves as a decorative inkwell.

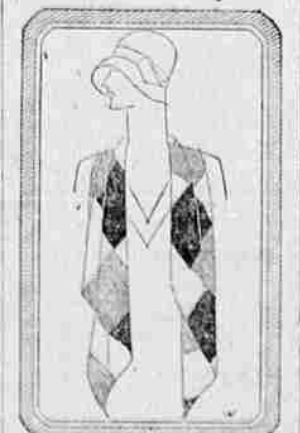
