3 BISHOPS NAMED AT M. E. ASSEMBLY

KANSAS CITY, May 26.—The election of a third bishop after a three-day deadlock, in which 20 ballots were cast, today permitted the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church here to turn to a mass of church business that has been virtually at a standstill since elections started Wednesday morning.

Choice of Dr. E. Stanley Jones, missionary to India, to fill the bishop's roster came late last night after a Philippine native bitterly protested elimination of an Episcopal residence in the far east.

The other two bishops elected here were Dr. Raymond J. Wade of Chicago, chosen on the second ballot, and Dr. James C. Baker of Urbana, Ill., on the sixth ballot.

Selection of Dr. Jones, for more than 20 years a missionary in India, completed the church roll of 33 bishops.

The conference voted today to adjourn next Tuesday. It has been in session three weeks.
