TRUCKMAN KILLED BY LUMBER PILE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 29.—Crushed underneath the ponderous weight of 4,000 board feet of lumber, Harvey McCollum, aged 35, was instantly killed today at McCollum's mill, 20 miles west of Klamath Falls. In backing a truck up to the lumber pile, McCollum went too far, the machine hit the supports on the lumber pile and the lumber fell forward onto the driver. He is survived by a widow and five children, and a brother, George McCollum, owner of the mill.

PORTLAND, May 29.—Better grade eggs were higher on local wholesale markets today following a cent increase in the quotations on standard extras and standard firsts to 26 cents and 24 cents, respectively. Outside demand for eggs was more active than for some time while receipts were quite light at 941 cases yesterday. No changes were quoted in butter prices.
Veal was firmer with best lights selling at 19¢ 20 cents. Other classes of meats inclined to drag.
Light and medium were easier, both classes selling around 20 cents.
Pears were also easy.
Strawberries receipts were lighter today but prices were not greatly affected. Most sales ranged from \$1.50 to 1.75 per crate. Many berries showed rain damage.

ON FIELD TRIP

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 29.—John Irving of Wilbur, junior in agricultural, is on a six-day field trip with five others of the department. They are making an 800-mile tour through southern and eastern Oregon stopping at some of the large sheep and cattle ranches to observe the methods of

pasturing and management. The group is visiting the large steer pastures in the vicinity of Fort Klamath, Ned Sherlock ranch at Lakeview, the Warre Snyder ranch and the "ZX" ranch at Paisley, and will inspect the Corralle sheep near Olney. The principle they will stop to get information on the fencing experiments being conducted by the United States forest service. They are traveling by automobile and camping along the way to make the most speed possible.
