China's Great Chief Near Waterloo

Impending Capture of Peking by Southern Forces Means End of Rule of Chang Tso-Lin, Ex-Bandit, Ally of Japan Against Russia, Favorite of Empress, Gambler With Money And Destiny

PEKING, May 29.—The Chinese Nationalist army and its allies are sweeping northward toward Peking, reaching for control of the capital city and threatening the dominion there of Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian war lord.

The history of China since the overthrow of the empire and the Manchurian dynasty in 1911 has been one of strife between the north and the south, divided geographically by rivers and mountains.

And Peking, because of its location, is now, as before, the center of northern activities and the goal of the invading hosts from the south.

North Ruler Ex-Bandit
Of all the eastern potentates of modern times none has lived a more romantic life than Shang Tso-Lin, the hapless of the Manchurian hills, who almost became emperor of China.

This time the forces which hope to drive him from Peking include the Nationalists, commanded by Chiang Kai-shek, and the armies of Feng Yu-shiang and Yen Hsi-shan, which have approached Peking from the south and west.

Chang Tso-Lin has become thoroughly accustomed to the successes and reverses of Chinese civil war. Early in the spring a year ago the Nationalist were driving toward Peking, and for days Chang had a train steamed up and headed toward Mukden, his retreat at a moment's notice.

But his peril did not keep him from holding a huge birthday party, which lasted almost two days around his home in east Peking.

Former Ally of Japan
Most of the stories of Chang Tso-Lin's life are probably more romantic than true. But he came from Shantung, and as a boy he became a bandit. By 1905 he was leader of one of the biggest bands in Manchuria, and when the Russo-Japanese war broke out he helped the Japanese by harrowing the Russians.

Then he came to Peking and won the favor of the old empress dowager. She took him and his band into government service, and in 1911, last year of the empire, he was made military governor of Fengtien, Manchuria's chief province.

Rules by Force
Since then Chang has had many ups and downs. Twice he has been war lord of Peking, coming there last two years ago by defeating the "Christian general," Feng, who now is at his throat again. Illiterate, but cunning, he scorns diplomatic rules by the law of club and fang.

Chang's chief vice, it is said, is gambling. He is reported to play mah jong for 48 hours at a stretch and to pay off his underlings when he loses in I. O. U.'s. In his harem are generally but four or five girls. Once when he brought a favorite concubine from Mukden he had an arch erected in Tientsin in her honor.

Peking itself is a city within a city. The Chinese portion is a mere 400 years old, while the Tartar settlement dates from 1267 and includes the "Forbidden City." The whole of Peking is surrounded by a wall 30 feet high and 25 feet thick at the base.

Since the republic was established Peking has lost much of its imperial mystery, and today the main streets of the city are broad avenues flanked with low houses and buildings and newly planted trees—the one spacious city in all China.

Now Plans Refuge
But the expected Waterloo did not come.

The nationalist fell into war among themselves. So Chang promoted himself from marshal to generalissimo and moved into the long-deserted palace of the yellow-roofed Forbidden City and surrounded himself with a bodyguard of Manchus, who before China became a republic had comprised the royal family. He consulted with his wise men upon an auspicious time to descend the dusty Dragon Throne and even employed silk weavers in Soochow to design coronation robes.

Now he looks again toward his Mukden refuge—but in China a live forever. Brand's Road Stand

RED NOMINEE FOR PRESIDENT THINKS SOVIET U. S. NEED

NEW YORK, May 28.—William Z. Foster, former I. W. W. leader, and Benjamin Gitlow, radical leader of New York, are the presidential and vice-presidential nominees, respectively of the Workers (communist) party of America.

They were named at the closing meeting of the party convention in New York yesterday.

"We must build a soviet government in the United States," Foster said in his speech of acceptance. "It will come and behind it will stand a red army." He told the delegates and party members present they must be ready "to turn the next imperialistic war into a civil war."

King George Is Loser by Revenue Exchange

Gets \$2,400,000 Allowance for Rentals Yielding England Over Twice as Much.

WINDSOR, England, May 29.—One of the biggest landlords in England is King George V.

He has lands comprising 276,000 acres, of which 108,000 are agricultural. The rest are house, store and manufacturing property.

Not only is the king one of the largest, but he is also one of the most efficient owners of land in the kingdom. From his lands the nation derived during the last fiscal year the record sum of \$5,500,000, which is exactly double the yield of 1915.

It is the nation, however, and not the king, which has benefited through these increases. The king received a fixed allowance of \$2,400,000 a year. When this amount was determined, however, the royal domain income was only \$2,400,000.

When a British monarch comes to the throne it is his usual practice to surrender the income from his lands in return for a fixed allowance from the state. He is not forced to make this agreement, however, and it would be his constitutional right to resume possession of his lands if he preferred.

When King George came to the throne he had a revenue from his lands of \$55,000, and an income from the nation of \$3,500,000. Queen Victoria's civil list, or income from the state, was \$1,900,000, approximately the income from her lands.

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
