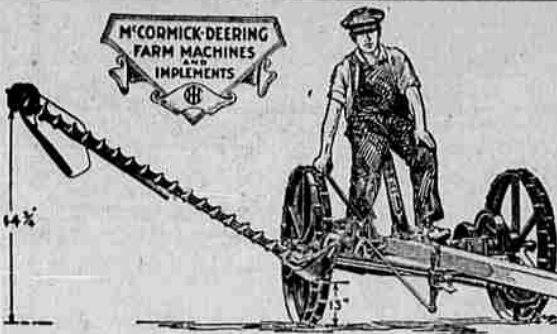

Word was received this morning by Mrs. G. S. Carroll and Mrs. D. C. Hamilton telling of the death of their mother, Mrs. Josephine Crabtree, pioneer of Tulare, California. Mrs. Crabtree passed away early this morning, death following failing health during the past few weeks.

Mrs. Crabtree was born in Illinois and was about 75 years old. Her parents were Nebraskans. When ten years old Mrs. Crabtree came to the west coast, settling in California, where she later met and married Allen Crabtree, who came west in the California gold rush of '49. His father was from England and his mother a southern woman. Mr. and Mrs. Crabtree had eleven children, nine girls and two boys, one of them dead. Mr. Crabtree passed away about 9 years ago. Three of the daughters live in Los Angeles, two in Tulare, one in Tucson, Arizona, and three, Mrs. Hamilton, Mrs. Carroll and Miss Ellen Crabtree in this city. The latter went to Tulare the first of the week after receiving word that her mother's condition was unimproved and the others were preparing to go south immediately. The son lives in Tulare. Mrs. Crabtree also leaves six grandchildren, one, Miss Grace Carroll, of this city and Mrs. W. Ferrell lies, formerly of Roseburg and now of San Francisco, and one great grandchild.

PORTLAND AUTOS ADD TO LIFE TOLL

WILLAMETTE DOES NOT YIELD KILLER SUSPECT'S BODY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31.—Dragging the Willamette river was resumed here today in an effort to clear up the mystery surrounding disappearance of George F. Masterson, in whose hotel room Mrs. Marjorie Stoy was shot to death early Tuesday, as is still in hiding in the city, were questions the police had not decided.

Masterson took a taxi to the depot, then returned to the hotel; took another taxi which he left at a down town street corner; went to the Sargeant hotel on the East Side, where he changed his clothes and then went out after asking the clerk to be directed to the nearest restaurant. This was about 4 a. m. He was not seen again. Whether he walked to a bridge and jumped into the river or took an early train or bus, or is still in hiding in the city, were questions the police had not decided.

TIDAL WAVE KILLS 400 JAPS, REPORT

TOKIO, May 31.—Newspaper dispatches from Sapporo say that 400 fishermen are missing and believed drowned in a huge tidal wave which destroyed the fishing fleet of Sarubutsu, on the northern coast of the Island of Hokkaido. Official confirmation of the dispatches were lacking.
