Wealth of America Is 320 Billions; Increasing Steadily, Banker Says

NEW YORK, May 31.—(A. P.)—The United States is worth \$320,000,000,000.

Its wealth has increased 4,400 percent since 1850 and is still on the rise.

Title to much of it is represented by the billions of dollars worth of securities which are bought and sold on the stock exchanges of this country, the number of which is growing yearly.

In the last five years 36,665 different issues of bonds and of preferred and common stocks were purchased by an army of American investors estimated to number 15,000,000. This is an increase of more than 5,000 per cent in the last 15 years, at the beginning of which period the number was computed at approximately 500,000.

The growth in number of investors and the sums invested by them is shown by the total of funds invested in securities by American purchasers in the last five years: 1923, \$4,912,760,000; 1924, \$6,064,000,000; 1925, \$6,811,810,000; 1926, \$7,213,520,000, and 1927, \$9,304,690,000.

The securities involved in these vast transactions comprised 34,995 issues of bonds at \$25,321,580,000; 1,163 issues of preferred stock at \$3,060,290,000, and 807 issues of common stock at \$2,814,910,000.

Approximately 21 per cent of the exceptional growth in 1927 is estimated to have represented refunding operations. The unusually abundant supply of money prevailing throughout the greater part of the year, with the inevitable low rates of interest, offered attractive opportunity to corporations for such readjustment.

Backer Also Woman
LONDON, June 5.—Mrs. Fredrick Guest, the former Mrs. Amy Phipps of Pittsburgh and the wife of Hedrick Guest, secretary of state for air from 1921 to 1922, today was revealed as the backer of the flight of the monoplane Friendship from America to England. She will fly to Southampton today to greet Miss Amelia Earhart and her companions on this year's first trans-Atlantic airplane flight to Europe.

"We hope the flight will serve as a link of continued friendship between America and England," Mrs. Guest said.

"I originally planned to have the Friendship land in the Thames opposite the historic houses of parliament, but the air ministry advised that Southampton would be safer."

Mrs. Guest said that the flight preparations had been under way throughout the winter at Boston where she had the cooperation of Commander Richard E. Byrd.

"I am indebted to Commander Byrd and also for the help of many of his friends," she said.

MOCK BATTLE TO FEATURE MEETING OF LEGIONNAIRES

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 4.—Arrangements have been completed with the war department for staging spectacular battle exercises and two great air circuses during the American Legion national convention to be held in San Antonio October 8 to 12.

Co-operation of the army has been pledged to the limit by Secretary of War Dwight F. Davis and Assistant Secretary of War Truett F. Davidson, in charge of aviation for the department, Philip B. Stapp, general Legion convention director, announced on his return from conferences just held with them at Washington.

The greatest fliers in the army will be assigned to put on the air circuses. Secretary Davis and Assistant Secretary Davidson told Mr. Stapp. One circus will probably be staged on Monday and the other on Friday of convention week.

Picked battalions from the famous old Second Division, which wrote its name large in the history of the World War, will stage the battle exercises, which will be the most elaborate and thrilling put on in America since the Armistice, Mr. Stapp stated. This will be in the form of a simulated attack on a prepared enemy position. Fliers will be assigned by the war department to demonstrate the dropping of 1100-pound bombs on the attacking troops.

Co-operation of the navy department has also been assured by Secretary Curtis D. Wilbur. Plans are being considered for sending the dirigible Los Angeles to the convention if arrangements can be worked out for mooring the big ship here.

The air circus and the battle maneuvers will be only two of the many big features of convention entertainment which San Antonio is going to put on for the Legion gathering. Mr. Stapp said. A world's championship rodeo, with the greatest performers in the game participating, will also be staged.
