"But I thought your father wasn't on good terms with that branch of the family," Nathaniel said, troubled.

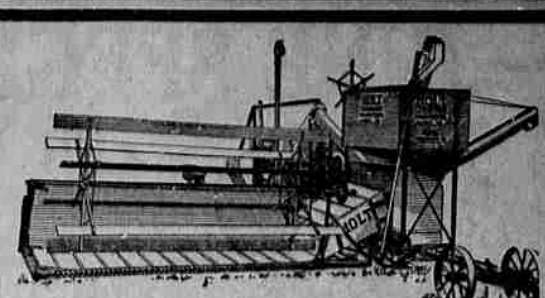
"That's true, but I'm sure he would help me."
