GLENDALE MAKES
PLANS TO PAVE
ITS MAIN STREETS

Committee of Council to Start Investigation and Make Report at Future Meeting.

GLENDALE, Ore.—(Special)—At the regular meeting of the city council this week, the topic of paving the principal streets of the city, which has long been a much discussed subject, received more attention and as a primary move in the project a committee was appointed by the mayor. The men named were: G. L. Wardrip, J. O. Lyttel, W. R. Stevens, J. H. Smith, E. H. Harvey and Gilbert Olsen.

This committee will investigate the various needs, get estimates on the most feasible route and will also look into the matter of oiling the main streets.

The city sets aside \$1,000 each year in their budget for graveling the streets and though the business section is in fairly good shape, there is considerable mud during the wet months.

The city of Glendale is said to be

in the best shape financially of any town in the county. Its total indebtedness is only \$4,000 in seven bonds, while offsetting that, the city has \$4,000 in the treasury as a general fund. The paving, which would cost from \$30,000 to \$50,000 as a rough estimate, would entail a tax of only 5 mills, it is said.

One of the proposed routes for pavement is up Pacific avenue, the main street, out Molly street to Gilbertson avenue to the city limits. The highway entering Glendale from the north is paved to within 200 feet of the limits.

The second proposed route is up Pacific avenue to Third street, which serves as the connecting link between Gilbertson avenue and the highway. In the latter instance, the upper part of the main street would probably not be paved. Either route necessitates a railroad crossing.

The committee will report their findings shortly and if the council decides in favor of the paving a special election will be called soon.

LIBERTY THEATRE
CLOSED; REOPENING
IS INDEFINITE

The Liberty Theatre, which is under the management of the Umpqua Amusement company, was closed last night, and will remain closed until conditions are improved, according to E. A. Gross, the local manager.

For some reason, which theatre owners are unable to explain, attendance at shows, all over the state, has taken a very marked drop. This is true not alone in Roseburg but elsewhere, and as a result the show business has been quite hard hit. The local theatres have also suffered from transient tent shows and other attractions recently visiting the city, so that it has been found impossible to operate both theatres profitably.

As a result it has been decided to close the Liberty Theatre during the vacation season, when there will be fewer people in town than usual, and to confine the operations of the company to the one theatre, the Antlers.

The management will endeavor to make the shows at the one theatre the very best possible, and will bring in the latest and best pictures. "The Crowd," which is now showing is one of the season's best releases.

Mr. Gross states that the Liberty Theatre will be reopened again if business conditions justify and if the company receives it there will be a number of improvements made.

THEFT CHARGE

Elmer and Alton Swan, residents of Glendale, were arraigned in the local justice court this morning on a charge of stealing a calf belonging to F. A. Booth, of Azalea.
