TWENTY-SIX FROM COUNTY CLUBS TO ATTEND SESSIONS

Group Boys and Girls Is Largest From Douglas to Go to Annual Summer School.

Twenty-six boys and girls representing the Boys' and Girls' Clubs from Douglas, Glendale, Gilde, Camas Valley, Melrose, Dillard, Roseburg, Blifton and Myrtle Creek will form the largest delegation ever attending from Douglas county at the annual Boys' and Girls' summer school in Corvallis June 11 to 23. Accompanied by J. Roland Parker, club leader in Douglas county, and Mrs. C. E. Marks, chaperone, the group will leave Roseburg Sunday morning for Corvallis.

Part of the boys and girls are paying expenses at the summer school with scholarships and the others are providing their own expense money. Fourteen of the club members have earned \$10 scholarships for outstanding club work and premiums on their exhibits at the state fair.

Each group of 15 girls has a chaperone at the summer school and will be stationed at Waldo Hall on the O. S. C. campus. The boys will have quarters in Cawthorn Hall.

Each morning from 8:30 to 12 while at the summer school the girls will devote their time to receiving instruction in sewing, cooking and the care of the household. All boys during the morning hours will be given training in first aid, athletics and receive instruction in all types of agricultural pursuits.

The afternoon sessions will be given over to recreation, including all athletic sports and games and swimming. In the evening lectures of an educational nature will be the program and pictures will be used in illustrating the talks.

Western Red Cedar Used for Many Purposes

"Tree of Life" to Indians, Ideal for Houses, Shingles, Boats for the White Man.

Sometimes called the "arborescens" the western red cedar is truly the "tree of life" to the Alaska Indians.

The walls that enclose the Indian's house, the blankets that keep him warm, the ropes, indispensable to fishing and in harnessing his dog teams, all come from the inner bark of the tree. He makes his canoes from the western red cedar and cuts the biggest specimen he can find for the Indian pole that he carries into his family tree.

Nearly nine-tenths of all the shingles manufactured in the United States are western red cedar.

Probably two-thirds of the cut of western red cedar goes into shingles, the remainder being used for lumber, poles, posts, piling and other uses where durability is important. Western red cedar poles, one account of their form and size, are shipped to nearly all parts of the United States.

Insect cedar, which gets its name from its remarkably aromatic quality, grows in California and southern Oregon. The cut is comparatively small and is practically all used locally except some high grade lumber which is shipped to wood-using factories and made into flash, doors and pencil shaves.

Port Orford cedar, noted for its beauty and also, grows only in a narrow belt bordering the coast of southern Oregon and northern California. The wood is in demand for ship and door construction and boat building.

European Larch Canker Spreads Westward From Atlantic Regions, Menacing Pacific Coast Fir Zone

WASHINGTON, June 8.—By spreading to the native tamarack, a ragged timber growth that fringes the northern United States from New England to the great forests of fir and pine in the west, European larch canker has become a potential menace to the timber wealth of North America.

Once the disease, similar in effect to Chestnut blight, is entrenched in Douglas fir, the timber industry of the Pacific coast will suffer a financial panic, forest pathologists say.

William A. Taylor, chief of the federal bureau of plant industry, outlined to congress the impending peril and asked that it include in the second deficiency appropriation bill a fund of \$25,000 with which to conduct experiments and investigations necessary for immediate control.

Brought From Europe Although it was not found in this country until last summer, it is believed the disease came over 225 European nurseries 15 or 20 years ago on shipments of European larch and possibly one or two other coniferous trees. At present it is most prominent in Massachusetts, where the disease of native commercial conifers leaves its influence more or less noticeable. However, it has attacked ornamental plantings of Douglas fir and yellow pine in the east, proving to pathologists the serious consequences that it reaches the west. There Douglas fir is abundant, representing one-fourth of the coniferous saw timber

supply of the country. Localizing Important Confined to the east, Dr. Taylor says, the disease would not be important. It could be controlled by present practice of cutting out all quarantined and by Massachusetts the best trees and infected timber. But the presence of tamarack, a relative of European larch, makes it possible for spores of the canker fungus to follow an unbroken path into the heart of the conifer strong hold.

While it is an entirely different fungus and attacks an entirely different species of trees, the European larch canker destroys conifers much the same as chestnut blight has destroyed virtually the entire stand of native American chestnut. It rots into the cambium layer, which is the inner bark of the tree, and eventually into the trunk, kills the tree, dwarfs the growth, and finally spoils the tree either for timber or ornamental use.
