Only the fact that she was doing something mattered, she would tell him.

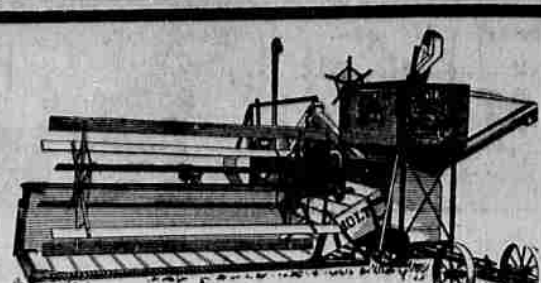
Yes, but what was that something going to be? Should she go back to Mrs. Phelps? Telephoning would save time. And she must look up other agencies. She would do that right away.
