D'AUTREMONT CASE EXHIBITS WILL BE SENT TO SPOKANE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

MEDFORD, Ore., June 7.—The 76 exhibits gathered by the postal department, the state of Oregon and the Southern Pacific railway, to weave a net of circumstantial evidence about the three D'Autremont boys, killers and bandits, now serving life sentences at Salem, will be shipped to Spokane, Wash., where they will be stored in the vaults of the postal department for future reference, if needed.

Postal Inspector Tennyson D. Jefferson and Maurice Corturi, special agent of the Southern Pacific, spent yesterday and this morning packing the exhibits.

They include everything from the stolen dynamite, detonator to the handful of eyelets used in a piece of tarpaulin. A half-hundred cartridges used by the D'Autremonts in their extensive target practice from Silverton, Ore., to the summit of the Siskiyou, in preparation for the crime, were also marked and sealed.

The postal department and railroad authorities moved the exhibits to make a chain, they would all be kept intact, and together, and not go astray during the changes of county officials, and moving from one court house to another here.

CHICAGO GIVES \$500,000 TO BUILD PLANETARIUM

CHICAGO, June 7.—A gift of \$500,000 from Max Adler, former Sears, Roebuck & Co. executive, for the construction of a planetarium on an island off Chicago's lake front near the Field museum was acknowledged today by Edward J. Kelly, president of the South Park commission.

The planetarium is a device designed to give the average person an opportunity to view the heavens as only astronomers heretofore have been able to do. It is

so arranged that the instructor or operator can bring into the planetarium "sky" a view of the heavens as they appear at any given time, such as when the Egyptians viewed them or as they will appear hundreds of years hence.

By working the apparatus the workings of the sky throughout a year can be reproduced in the space of a few minutes time.

The couple plan to sail tomorrow from New York for an extended European tour. Chicago will be their permanent home upon their return, she said.

Spiegel, who is associated with his father in the furniture business, met Miss Lauphler while she was playing a theatrical engagement here a year after she had won the Atlantic City beauty crown.

KAHANAMOKU GIVES UP HIS OLYMPIC CHANCE FOR FILMS

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—So enamored has Duke Kahanamoku become with motion picture acting that the United States, in its 1928 quest for Olympic games laurels, will have to do without services of the Hawaiian whose Olympiad record stands unequalled in swimming annals.

To Stockholm, to Antwerp and to Paris, in the games of 1912, 1920 and 1924, the "duke" went, and this year he started training for his fourth Olympic team berth. Yesterday, however, there came an announcement from the 38 year old swimmer that he had given up his chances for a trip to Amsterdam in order to accept a motion picture contract. He said:

"I hate to give up swimming, and I certainly shall miss the Olympic tryouts and finals, but I like movies and as this is my first real chance there really was no choice."

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EUGENE MINISTER WILL LEAD CONGO EXPLORATION

EUGENE, Ore., June 7.—Dr. Jesse R. Kellems, Eugene minister and ethnologist, with Harold Richards, also of Eugene will leave on Thursday, June 14, for South Africa, where they will spend two years. Their travels will include

an exploration trip by boat out of Bolenge in the Congo, up to a branch of the Congo river to the Ituri forest, where they will study the pigmy tribes and their habits of life.

Dr. Kellems, who is a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of London, will lead the party, which will include six men. Films of the

trip will be taken. Frank Buttram, chairman of the board of regents of the University of Oklahoma and millionaire oil man is financing the expedition.
