Chain Store's Home City Obligation Stated

Failure to Help Develop by Constructive Policy Means Loss to Themselves.

The obligation of the chain store, often painted as a ruthless monster, to contribute to the development of the community in which it thrives, is asserted in emphatic terms by E. C. Sams, president of the J. C. Penney Company, one of the largest of these organizations, in an address at the domestic distribution session of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

"No man," he said, "whether he be of the chain or of an independent organization, is so mean that he lives on the good name and prosperity of a community others have built and feels no sense of obligation to pick up and carry on where others have left off.

"With me it is a conviction that the chain store is making great contributions to the economic life of the consumer. It is bringing constructive policies and methods into business which can only result in the advancement of the art of distribution. To the extent that this is true the public is entitled to know it.

"If, on the other hand, certain chain store organizations are shortsighted enough to fail to recognize that they should play their part in the development of their local community, if they are selfish enough to take all they can get and give as little as possible in return, then their only hope for gain is to get while the getting is good. They eventually will be tripped by their own avarice and indifference toward the public and will fall into the clasp of their own making."
