WOMEN THROW AWAY DIGNITY AT CONVENTION

Madly Human as They Join in Demonstrations for Hoover and Curtis.

TWO SPEAK IN "MIKE"

Mrs. Ruth McCormick Says No to Effort Made to Name Her Hoover's Running Mate.

KANSAS CITY, June 15.—Women crashed the political game in dead earnest during the early hours of the lengthy nominating session of the republican convention last night.

Important feminine political figures that have been determining factors in many of the midnight conferences in stuffy hotel rooms let fly their dignity, and led delegations in the two stampedes for Hoover and Curtis.

Two of them reassumed their serious manner, and stepped upon the platform to voice their seconds to the nominations of the two men. Untroubled by the blinding glare of the photographers' lights that were directed upon her as she took her place before the speaker's stand, Mrs. Christine Bradley South of Kentucky, in a clear, loud tone, told the world that the women were behind Hoover.

Her diminutive stature necessitated lowering the microphone to come within range of her mouth, but it didn't bother her. She stepped smilingly to one side and graciously accepted the applause that accompanied her appearance as the concession of her height was made.

Mrs. H. J. Cornell of St. John, Kans., alternate, made the first address seconding the nomination of Senator Curtis. Taller, broader than Mrs. South, the microphones had to come up again.

Dignity to the Winds
On the floor womanhood was in turmoil during the long demonstration for the commerce secretary and Kansas senator, Mabel Willebrandt, chairman of the resolutions committee, a delegate from California and one of Hoover's most ardent workers, forgot the composure and seriousness with which she addressed the convention on Wednesday, picked up a bag and led the yelling California delegation on its cheering way through the aisles.

After the 25 minute demonstration she returned to her seat in the California section and initiated a great business of backslapping, handclapping and general whooping. On the large perfect waves of her simply dressed hair became a bit disarranged and it took several pats of a trembling hand to put it in order.

Little Mrs. "Polly" Timmer, wife of the Kansas who made the nominating address for Senator Curtis, presented a striking contrast to her 200-pound as she took part in the aisle in the madhouse outbreak that greeted the buxom "Polly" appearance on the platform.

From the strictly Hoover delegation from Rhode Island came a brave, slim figure to join in the Curtis demonstration. It was Mrs. Leona Curtis Knight, daughter of the Kansas candidate and a member of the eastern delegation. Being the Hoover enthusiast, she was the only member of her delegation to remain in the section, a lone little figure in an all-white costume.

When her father was being acclaimed, she entered the list carrying a tiny flag. As she returned to her delegation several of the men informally slapped her upon the back in sincere congratulation.

Mrs. McCormick Halts Doom
Miss Ruth Hannah McCormick, candidate for congress from Illinois, and one of Lawrence's hardiest workers, had been scheduled to make an address seconding her candidate's nomination, but the former governor's withdrawal left her without a public appearance before the convention.

Talk in the Illinois ranks of efforts made to have Mrs. McCormick's name put up for the vice-presidential nomination led her to explain that several of the leaders had asked her permission. "I felt that I could really do something more for the women of this country if I just devoted myself to the business of getting elected to congress," she said.

Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth occupied a strategic position directly behind Chairman Moses' chair during both sessions yesterday and last night. Moses and several of the speakers frequently conferred with her during the proceedings.

The two demonstrations of the evening were no respecters of persons for every socially as well as politically prominent woman of the convention was seen to enter the noisy demonstrations in some way or another. Mrs. Jacob L. Lohoe, official mistress of the convention sat very straight in her box, a broad smile on her face as she ceremoniously waved an American flag in each hand dur-

KAROOK INDIANS LEAD HOPI RIVALS IN COAST DERBY

GEYSERVILLE, Cal., June 15.—Two Karook Indians this morning had a comfortable lead over the remainder of the field of 25 runners in the second day's running of the Redwood highway marathon.

Flying Cloud, second place winner in last year's race, at 7:38 a. m., was resting at Cloverdale, 84 miles from Santa Rosa, his starting place at 5:50 a. m., this morning. Three miles behind him was Mad Bull, another Karook, who took first place honors last year, with a seven mile advantage over Chief Goyser, in third place. Mad Bull, however, was experiencing trouble with his feet and there were rumors of disunion between Bill Hayward, track coach of the University of Oregon, and at present trainer of the Karook and Mad Bull's father, the latter claiming Hayward was endeavoring to hold the runner back by making him believe his feet were in bad condition.

Mad Bull was forced to pull up for medical treatment nine miles south of Cloverdale after a rest. He was severely contused, but his trainer said he would continue. The Karook had covered seventy-seven miles since leaving Sausalito.

One of the Hopi, Arthur Pohiquayeva, named Thunder Bird, dropped out of the race this morning with a badly sprained right ankle. His trainer said he could not continue. The Hopi was one of the favorites. The rest of the field, with the exception of Chochee, Zuni Indian, trained by Mike Kirs, was strung out between here and Santa Rosa. Chochee was nowhere to be found, having dropped out of sight since leaving Santa Rosa early today and Kirs was conducting a frantic search for him.

CHANGES MADE IN ORGANIZATION OF TELEPHONE COMPANY

Appointment of F. H. Shea, traffic superintendent for the state of Oregon, with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, for the past few years, as general traffic employment supervisor for Oregon, Washington and Idaho, was made known this week by H. R. Halsey, division commercial manager.

At the same time Mr. Halsey announced the selection of G. E. Kellogg, formerly division commercial supervisor for Oregon, to succeed Mr. Shea, and the selection of E. J. Jolly, of the division staff, to succeed Mr. Kellogg. Mr. Kellogg's new title will be that of division traffic manager. His headquarters will be in the Telephone building, Portland.

Mr. Shea, in taking over his new duties, will make his headquarters in Seattle, but he will keep in close touch with Portland and Oregon. He has been in telephone work for nearly thirty years, having started in with the New York Telephone company in 1899 shortly following his discharge from the army at the end of the Spanish-American war. He has been on the Pacific coast since 1907, being connected with the Pacific company the entire time. He is well known in Portland.

Mr. Kellogg also has had many years of telephone service, first being connected with the Mountain States company in Arizona. For North.

MANY DIVORCES ARE BEING FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

The Halls were married at Roseburg, August 7, 1927. Attorney Carl Wimberly is the plaintiff's attorney. The Eons were also married at Roseburg, October 13, 1927. Attorney Long is his attorney.

Description is charged by Cory Huntington against Florence L. Huntington. They were married at Centralia, July 2, 1920. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney R. B. Conpton.
