BURNETT HELD TO BLAME FOR AUTO TRAGEDY

to tell whether his stupor was caused by liquor or by shock. John Montgomery, Charles Chamberlain, Ethel Lander and Grace Bonin, were in the car which brought the body of Mrs. Gardner and the injured young man to Roseburg. All four were called as witnesses and their statements corresponded accurately.

They stated that about a half mile west of the scene of the wreck their car was passed by the Chamberlain car, going between 20 and 25 miles per hour, they agreed, and Burnett was apparently traveling about 30 or 35. The two cars were side by side for quite a little distance, one of the witnesses stated. The occupants of the Chamberlain car were acquainted with Burnett and the horns of the two cars were sounded as a signal and the Chamberlain car went by.

Arriving at the scene of the wreck Mr. Chamberlain halted his car and he and Montgomery went back to the overturned Burnett car. Another car was just ahead of them and had stopped a little beyond the wrecked auto, they said. Chamberlain and Montgomery went to the overturned car, while Miss Lander and Miss Bonin stayed in their own machine, not going over to the wrecked vehicle.

Mr. Chamberlain hit a match by which he could see Burnett, lying in the bottom of the wreckage with Mrs. Gardner's body partly across him. Chamberlain and Montgomery tore away the top of the wrecked car, and lifted out the two bodies, putting them both into the Chamberlain car which was then driven into Roseburg, stopping at Coon Junction long enough to leave word for the people there to phone ahead for a doctor.

Did Not Smell Liquor
All of these witnesses agreed that they did not smell liquor at the scene of the wreck or upon Burnett's breath. Burnett, they said, was in a dazed and semiconscious condition in which he kept calling for his companion, Frank Cooper. He made no statement regarding the wreck itself, they said.

Burnett Questioned
After the examination of these witnesses, the inquest being held at the Roseburg Undertaking Parlor, the jury went to the hospital, where Burnett was questioned as he lay in bed in his room.

In response to questions asked by District Attorney Gordon, Burnett said that his party started home right after the last dance and that he noticed the Tugler car some little distance before the crash occurred. He said that he noticed the car had only one light, but could not remember which light it was that was burning. He said that his own lights were sufficiently bright to furnish him good illumination for driving, and that he was confident that he was on his own side of the road at the time of the impact.

He said that he could remember nothing of the accident, being knocked unconscious when his car came together.

Bottle Contained Listerine
He stated that he had not been drinking at any time during the evening. The bottle that was removed from his pocket, he said, contained listerine. He said that he had been having trouble with his throat and had purchased a bottle of listerine earlier in the day and had been carrying it in his coat pocket and that it was still there on the way back from the dance.

He stated that he had danced only with Mrs. Lucas, Mrs. Gardner and Mrs. Lucas' mother at the dance. Testifying regarding the condition of his car he said that there were no mechanical defects, and that he had had no trouble in handling it. He also testified that he was watching the road at the time of the accident and had both hands on the wheel.

Responsibility Placed
After securing Burnett's testimony the jury returned to the Roseburg Undertaking Parlor, where more than an hour was spent in deliberation over the case, before a verdict was reached. After the usual statement regarding the findings the jury reported that Mrs. Gardner came to her death "in an automobile accident, being a head-on collision between a Studebaker car driven by Gordon Burnett, and a Buick sedan driven by James Boles and owned by 29 Mr. Tugler, Edna Parke Gardner being an occupant of the Burnett car, and we further find that Gordon Burnett is guilty of a crime thereby."

A formal charge will probably be placed against the young man in the immediate future and he will be placed under bond for appearance before the grand jury at the next regular meeting of that body.
