PIONEER RIDDLE WOMAN DEAD AT AGE 62 YEARS

After several years' illness of heart trouble, Mrs. Jennie B. Crosby, of Riddle, a member of one of Douglas county's prominent pioneer families, died at Portland Sunday, June 17, at the age of 62. The funeral will be held at the Episcopal guild hall at Riddle next Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Eastern Star lodge, of which Mrs. Crosby was a member, will conduct the last rites at the place of interment in Riddle cemetery.

Mrs. Crosby was the widow of David W. Crosby who died about three years ago and with whom she conducted a hotel at Riddle for over 20 years. She was born at that place October 30, 1869, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Riddle, among the earliest of the county's settlers. Her mother still resides there. Also surviving her are two children, D. B. Crosby, of Medford, and Mrs. Margaret Cutsforth, of Portland; two brothers, County Clerk Ira B. Riddle, of Roseburg, and Ed. W. Riddle, of Riddle; two sisters, Mrs. Millie F. Stauffer, of Tual, Calif., and George Foster, of Riddle, and three grandchildren, Raymond Crosby, of Medford, and Harry and Curtis Cutsforth of Portland.

Failing health compelled Mrs. Crosby to retire from the hotel business several years ago. Her death occurred in Portland. Sanitarium, where she had been under treatment for some time.

EUROPEAN FARMERS BENEFITING FROM DEPT. AGRICULTURE RADIO METHODS

The example of the United States Department of Agriculture is being followed by Old World ministries of agriculture.

For two years Czechoslovakia has carried on an agricultural radio program inspired by the United States Department of Agriculture's pioneer work in broadcasting weather reports, market news, and farm educational programs.

New French governmental authorities are developing plans for a farm broadcast schedule from government-controlled stations in Paris. Prof. Bernard Trouvot of the National School of Horticulture at Versailles recently conferred with Morse Salisbury, chief of radio service in the Department of Agriculture, upon methods of organizing and presenting educational radio programs for farmers and home makers.

It is probable, Professor Trouvot said, that the French farm broadcasting service will provide reception facilities for farmer listeners as well as prepare the talks and do the broadcasting. Because of the present small number of radio receivers in rural France the government probably will set up receivers at central points in the village so that the peasants may gather in groups to hear the farm broadcasts.

CHINA DEMANDS EQUALITY WITH WORLD POWERS

PEKING, June 18.—Nationalism, democracy and socialism—the three fundamental principles established by the late Dr. Sun Yat Sen, founder of the nationalist party, constitute the basis of the regime which the nationalist government has set up in China.

In a declaration issued last week asking for the cooperation of all friendly nations the nationalists avowed the end of militaristic rule and set forth their aims for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of the unified China.

The nationalist government seeks to negotiate new treaties with the powers based on absolute equality and mutual respect for sovereignty about the same time the powers were requested to withdraw their troops from China.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—The usual Monday morning calm pervaded local wholesale produce markets today. Prices were generally steady and supplies of most commodities liberal.

All kinds of berries were plentiful and moved easily. Strawberries brought around \$1.75 per crate for best offerings, raspberries averaged around \$3 per crate, and loganberries sold mostly at \$2.50.

Local lettuce was also higher, 3 dozen cases going at \$1.75 to \$2.00, net feds.

Poultry prices were generally easier along the wholesale way with supplies of all classes, except heavy hens, lower generally. Young ducks were unchanged at 15¢/20¢, but demand was nominal and supplies heavy.

Pork prices showed no price changes early but it was thought that the quotations on pork might shade downward a trifle as receipts were unusually heavy and demand easy. Beef, veal and lamb markets displayed a steady to firm tone.

Butter and eggs were unchanged today but trading was active and it was thought the quotation on top grade eggs might advance 3¢ or so late today.

Miss Helen Willis kept the United States women's tennis team in the running in the defense of the Wimbledon cup today by defeating Miss Eileen Bennett, England's best, 6-3, 6-2.

In winning the first set with ease against the girl who is ranked as the best tennis player of her sex in England at the present time, Miss Willis continued where she left off in the final for the French championship recently, in which she downed Miss Bennett in straight sets. Miss Willis received a great deal of cheering when she took the court and her smashing drives drew bursts of applause from the gallery. Mrs. M. Holcroft Watson, defeated Mrs. Molla Mallory of the United States in the first of today's matches, 2-6, 6-1, 6-2.

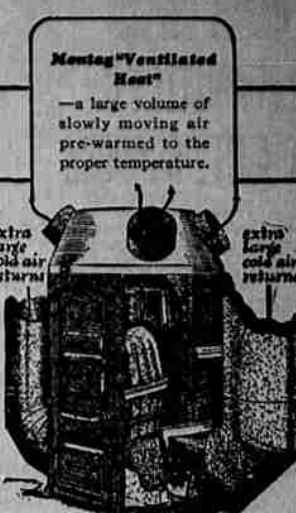

HOLDERS DEFUNCT CHAIN STOCK GET FALSE REPORTS

SALEM, June 16.—Stockholders of the insolvent Cosmopolitan Chain Stores have reported to the state corporation department that a lawyer named Anderson has called on them with the offer to bring suit in their behalf to recover on their stock subscriptions in return for a fee of 10 per cent of the amount of their stock.

Corporation Commissioner McCallister is informed that Anderson claims to have the approval of the corporation department. McCallister denies this, and says that the only call Anderson made to the department was to look over the records of the Cosmopolitan company.

According to the stockholders who have been approached, Anderson claims there is available to them the sum of \$50,000, which is held by a liquidation committee.

One Salem woman told the commissioner that she gave Anderson a check for \$100.

CRIPPLE CREEK TO CELEBRATE GOLD STRIKE OF 1921

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., June 16.—Visitors from many sections of the country were trekking into this gold mining town tonight to attend the celebration tomorrow of the gold strike here in 1921.

In '21, Bob Womack, Broken Bow cowboy, opened the lode in Poverty Gulch that yielded nearly half a billion dollars in gold.

Included in the crowd that will celebrate the strike tomorrow will be many of the original Cripple Creekers, the men who joined in the stampede to this district that was the greatest the state ever saw.

Included in the program will be a second stampede. "Prospectors" armed with shovels will be lined up and at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon will be started together toward the spot where the original strike was made and where \$1,500 in gold pieces has been buried to reward the stampedeers.

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GOVERNMENT BEEF GRADING AND STAMPING PUT ON FEE BASIS

The government beef grading and stamping service will be placed on a fee basis beginning July 1 and will be available to slaughterers, packers, wholesalers, jobbers, hotels, restaurants and retailers in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture has announced.

Graded and stamped beef, however, will be available in any part of the United States served by slaughterers or dealers who avail themselves of this service. Official graders are stationed in each of the above cities and will provide the service on request of either buyers or sellers at a charge of \$2.00 per hour. Based on the experience of the past year this charge will amount to less than a per carcass. Whereas, heretofore, the service has been limited to "prime," "choice" and "good" grades of steer and heifer beef, after July 1 it will be extended to include all classes and grades of beef.

The beef grading and stamping experiment, in which beef carcasses are graded and then stamped by the government graders so that each subsequent retail cut will show the government label indicating the class and grade, was begun a little more than a year ago at the request of many livestock producers and members of the meat trade, and with the active cooperation of the better Beef Association and the National Livestock and Meat Board and the support of many prominent livestock producers, slaughterers, and retailers.

This service has been popular with consumers inasmuch as the Government stamp has been an accurate measure of quality and a safeguard against the sale of inferior beef at high prices. Many retailers who have used the service report a steadily increasing demand for high grade beef, and it is estimated that by the end of June approximately 66,213 carcasses or 36,417 pounds of beef will have been graded and stamped.

Department officials regard the experiment as having proven the practicability and desirability of grading and stamping beef according to fixed universal standards. Congress has not provided funds with which to continue the experimental service after June 30, but in view of the wide demand for grading and stamping the department has decided to place the work on a fee basis beginning July 1, under the provisions of an act authorizing the Secretary of Agriculture to investigate and certify the class, quality (grade), and condition of certain perishable farm products.

WALKER AND HUDKINS EACH PREDICT K. O.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Jack Malone, the rugged St. Paul battler who believes he ought to know, can see nothing but victory for Mickey Walker when he defends his middleweight title against the onslaughts of Ace Hudkins at Comiskey Park Thursday night.

Malone, who has fought Walker five times and who holds a 10-round decision over him, believes the champion is too smart for the Nebraska challenger.

Champion and challenger will wind up their heavy transaction tomorrow. Both are confident of victory and both say the bout will end by a knockout. Walker suffered a slight cut over his eye yesterday while sparring with Tuffy Griffith of Sioux City but otherwise is in good condition.

Promoter Mullen, who expects a \$200,000 gate for the match, reports receipts have passed the \$125,000 mark.
