ROBBED 2ND TIME

DURING THIS YEAR

IONE, Wash., June 16.—Two youthful bandits held up the Ione State Bank at 10 o'clock this morning, lined a number of patrons up against a wall, took \$1,000 in cash from the counter and escaped in an automobile. A woman screamed and they fled, attracting the attention of a passerby who fired several ineffectual shots at the robber car.

Miss Elizabeth Thompson, cashier, and Mrs. Ethel Briggs, assistant cashier of the bank, were covered by the gun of the masked robber who held them up.

The other man wore glasses but no mask, meanwhile scooped up the silver and bills and they raced away.

Their light automobile was seen at Tiger, a few miles south of Ione on the Pend-Oreille highway, where it turned off the road, apparently headed for Colville. Sheriff's forces at Colville, Northport, and all through Pend-Oreille county were notified.

The fee allowed at present is 10 cents per head from the county and 15 cents from the owners.
