BOTH WALKER AND HUDKINS SURE OF WIN TOMORROW

CHICAGO, June 20.—"I'll stop Hudkins within six rounds." "I am confident of defeating Walker and winning the middleweight title." That's the way Mickey Walker, world's middleweight boxing champion, and Ace Hudkins, Nebraska "Wildcat" challenger, sized up each other as they tapered off training today for their title contest at Comiskey Park tomorrow night. Both boxers wound up their strenuous part of their training yesterday. The challenger was not to box today, but was locked to go through some limbering-up exercises in a downtown gymnasium while Walker confined his program to a long walk.

Walker has been guaranteed \$75,000 with a privilege of 42 1/2 per cent of the net receipts. Hudkins has been guaranteed \$25,000 with a privilege of 22 1/2 per cent. Promoter Jim Mullen is planning to handle a \$200,000 gate, the largest in the history of the middleweight division.

May Be Last Meeting

It is very possible that the Roseburg convention may be the last session of the Oregon State Department of the G. A. R. The ranks of the union veterans are thinning rapidly and only a few of the veterans of the Civil War now remain. The membership in the organization is becoming so small, and the members are reaching such an age that the conventions are found to be attracting a smaller and smaller number each year, so that there is considerable talk of making this meeting the last. There was a motion before the last national convention to disband, but was voted down, but there was considerable sentiment in favor of the motion, and it may carry this year. With the national convention in the balance it is thought very possible that the various states will take similar action and that in Oregon the Roseburg meeting may be the last of this order that has occupied such a great and prominent place in the country's history.

Reception Thursday

Because of the fact that the national officers will not arrive until Wednesday afternoon, the public reception instead of being held the first day as usual, will not be held until Thursday. There will be an address of welcome by a city official on the first day of the convention, but the public entertainment and reception will be held over until the national officers can be present.

As this reception falls upon the same night as the band concert, arrangements are being made to have the band play at the armory. Additional music will be given by the Kiwanis orchestra and the Chamber of Commerce chorus, together with several stunts features. Talks will be made by the national, state and local officers. This meeting will be open to the general public.

The annual parade will be held at 11 o'clock on the morning of Thursday, June 28. Members of all of the organizations will be in line for this event.

One of the interesting groups in attendance will be the state G. A. R. drum corps from Portland. This organization will provide life and drum music for the parade and other stunts of the convention.

Friday noon will be held one of the colorful events of the convention, a dinner for all visitors at the Oregon Soldiers Home. The dinner is to be served in the big fire grove, which is now being made ready for the occasion. At that time the Relief Corps will present a flag to the Roseburg high school and the Ladies of G. A. R. will present a portrait of President Lincoln to the same school. The Auxiliary to Sons of Veterans will give a flag to the Camp Fire Girls and the Daughters of Veterans will give a flag to the Boy Scouts. Delegations from each of these recipient organizations will be present, the Camp Fire Girls and Boy Scouts in uniform and motion pictures will be made of the ceremonies.

A tree dedication at the Soldiers Home will also be a feature of the program on that day. A decorative cedar tree has just been planted in the beautiful yard at the state institution and is to be dedicated to the G. A. R. A bronze tablet will be placed beside the tree, which will stand as a mighty and beautiful living monument for many years to come as a reminder of the work done by the veterans of the Civil War.

Assistance Given

Local organizations are giving full cooperation and assistance in helping to make the convention a success. The local patriotic orders, particularly the Spanish War Veterans and American Legion members, are taking charge of the actual arrangements, and have been given the help of the Chamber of Commerce and the several service clubs. The Camp Fire Girls are giving their services as ushers and the Boy Scouts are to serve as orderlies and guides.

Other Presidential Campaigns—1916

The summer of 1916 found the European war raging, and, although the United States was not yet engaged, leaders of his party urged that President Woodrow Wilson must be retained as the nation's executive regardless of partisanship. He was nominated by the democrats in convention at St. Louis, June 16, as was Thomas R. Marshall for the vice presidency, and the democrats waged their campaign on the slogan: "He kept us out of war."

The republicans met in Chicago, June 8 to 13, and selected for president Charles Evans Hughes of New York, who had resigned from the supreme bench after he had become a candidate for nomination. Charles Warren Fairbanks of Indiana was nominated for vice president.

The election was close, and at first it appeared that Hughes and Fairbanks had been elected, but Wilson's victory in California, attributed by some to surviving disaffection of the progressive republicans there for the party from which they had broken away in the 1912 campaign, gave Wilson the presidency for a second term.

HUMAN FLY TO SCALE FACE OF GRAND HOTEL

J. Johnny Woods, generally known as "Daredevil Woods," a human fly, is in Roseburg this week, preparing for a special appearance at the Antlers theatre on Friday and Saturday nights of this week. As a special feature, advertising Dodge Brothers cars for J. O. Newland & Son, local dealers, he will scale the front of the Grand hotel building twice Thursday, once at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, and in the afternoon and again at 7:30 in the evening.

Woods has been in the stunt business for over 15 years, and has scaled hundreds of buildings, frequently mounting as high as 25 stories, making his way up the face of buildings by use of only the natural projections. After reaching the top of a building, he defies fate all further by staging a balancing act on the edge of the roof, where he does head and hand stands for the entertainment of the crowds in the street.

He started his work as a performer at the age of 13 years, doing acrobatic work. The forearm and hand development which resulted from this work, coupled with a natural ability in balance, drew him into work as a performer in balancing and muscle control and he has been in vaudeville for a number of years.

His advertising stunt on Thursday in climbing the face of the Grand hotel, will be done without ropes, hooks or any other kind of apparatus or equipment. He will make the first attempt at 2:30 in the afternoon, and will scale the building again at night. On Friday and Saturday nights he will appear in connection with the regular show at the Antlers theatre.

PRESIDENT PORTO RICAN SENATE IS NEARLY KILLED

SAN JUAN, P. R., June 19.—Antonio Barcelo, president of the Porto Rico senate, was in the hospital today with a four inch wound in his side, inflicted with a sharp-edged chisel wielded by Jose Matos.

Matos was shot in the scuffle which ensued and his condition was critical. He was being held today in prison under heavy guard to protect him from an outraged populace.

Police were unable to establish a motive for the attempted assassination.

Senor Barcelo had just returned from the United States where he received an honorary degree of doctor of laws from Columbia university. He was speaking at a celebration in his honor, when Matos pushed his way through the crowd and stabbed Barcelo.

There was a shot from somewhere. Whether it was fired by a policeman or some one else was not determined. Matos fell and was seized by the police.

A bulletin issued from the hospital said the senate president's condition was not serious.
