HOOVER URGED TO MAKE SPEECHES IN NEW YORK STATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Members of the special committee of the republican national committee who are to confer tomorrow with Secretary Hoover, the party's presidential candidate, and Senator Curtis, the vice presidential nominee, began arriving today and were received by Mr. Hoover.

Business which was to come before the conference between the candidates and the committee tomorrow was discussed and it was said that a complete slate of committee officials and campaign plans would be drafted quickly at the conference.

Secretary Work, frequently mentioned as the new party national chairman, was with Hoover late last night and early today and Osgood Mills, under-secretary of the treasury, one of the leaders of the Hoover New York force, came to the office at the commerce department to present Mrs. Ruth Pratt, New York City alderman, and a group of New York people.

They were said to have urged particular attention to the New York state campaign and to have expressed a hope that the secretary would make one or two appearances there during the campaign.

Campaign arrangements still constituted the most troublesome points for discussion by committee members. It is now definite that Mr. Hoover will go through to California to await his formal notification of nomination, while Senator Curtis will receive his notice in Kansas. The secretary is represented as desiring two or three quiet weeks in which to work on his speech of acceptance, usually classed as a most important campaign document.

L. B. SUTTON NEW ROTARIAN CHIEF

MINNEAPOLIS, June 20.—L. B. Sutton, of Tampico, Mexico, third vice president, was elected president of Rotary International today as the organization discarded its usual machinery for balloting and named him by acclamation.

Mr. Sutton, a native of Michigan, is in the hardware jobbing business in Mexico. He was a founder of the American Chamber of Commerce at Tampico and served as its president in 1918.

In 1923 he was made governor of the Third Rotary district, comprising Mexico, and in 1926 international director. He was elected vice president last year.

LOUGHRAN AND LATZO TO STAGE RETURN BATTLE

U. S. BOY TENNIS STAR DEFEATS CANADIAN VET

STOWAWAYS START MELEE ON CRUISER

COLOMBO, Ceylon, June 20.—The British cruiser Enterprise has received a wireless message from the Australian Commonwealth liner Jarvis Bay, out of Adelaide June 9, for London, stating that she was having trouble with "eight desperado stowaways."

The message asked if there were any warships in her vicinity.

The Enterprise, which is stationed in the East Indies, replied: "No warship your vicinity. Report if situation serious."

LONDON, June 20.—The London offices of the Commonwealth Line said today that they had heard

nothing from the Jarvis Bay although she carries a short wave wireless capable of communicating with London.

Agents of the line said that the ship has 600 passengers and a crew of 120 aboard.

DEFECTIVE STEERING GEAR CAUSED WRITER'S DEATH

CORR, Irish Free State, June 20.—Death of Donn Byrne, American-Irish writer, today was attributed to the defective steering gear of his new automobile. As described by his secretary, he was drowned after four successive accidents to the careening car. A verdict of accidental death was returned at an inquest. He lost his life near his Irish residence, Coomain Castle, at Brandon.

VOICE AND TELEVISION SUCCESSFULLY TESTED

CHICAGO, June 20.—A successful broadcast of voice and television at the same time was made last night over station WCFL, the Chicago Federation of Labor, in an experiment under a special permit issued by Samuel Pickard, the federal radio commissioner.

A view of the head and shoulders of E. N. Nockels, secretary of the Chicago federation, was broadcast with his voice and received by the inventors of the process, M. J. Hayes and Ulysses Zuarbria, over their receiving apparatus located several miles distant.

LONG TERM PHONE FRANCHISE HITS SNAG IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, June 20.—Fixing of telephone rates for a period of 25 years, as proposed in the new Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company franchise now before the city council, is opposed by Colonel A. E. Clark, chairman of the committee appointed by the legislature to investigate telephone rates. The franchise should provide for a revision of rates at least every five years, he said today in a communication to Commissioner Mann.

"In view of the rapid and constant change in methods, practices and facilities of public service corporations, particularly telephone companies, the practice of granting long term franchises with fixed and inflexible provisions is of doubtful wisdom, especially in a large and growing city like Portland," the communication said.

Provision should be made allowing the city council to make definite demands upon the company for reports the letter continues. There should also be a declaration that the company considers the new rate schedule as reasonable. This would eliminate chances of the company going before the public service commission with claims that private reservations had been made to the agreement when it was accepted.

DEFUNCT CHAIN STORES AGENT FACING ARREST

SALEM, June 21.—Obtaining money by false pretenses is charged against J. A. Anderson, claiming to be a California lawyer, in a warrant for arrest issued here yesterday. Anderson, accompanied by E. J. Frazier of Eugene, is accused of persuading stockholders of the insolvent Cosmopolitan chain stores to pay him 10 percent of their subscriptions as fees to start litigation against the company.

The whereabouts of Anderson is not known. Frazier has been about Salem for several days, and on Tuesday told State Corporation Commissioner McCallister that he would pay back the money obtained. He turned over \$500 to McCallister as part of the amount. It is believed the two men collected about \$1,500.

The charges against Anderson are based on affidavits obtained by McCallister from some of the stockholders.

TEN MILLION ELECTRIC REFRIGERATORS IN TEN YEARS, IS PREDICTION

Ten million electric refrigerators of various sizes will be in service in the United States in ten years or less, according to Francis J. Oppenheimer, in Nation's Business.

The extraordinary progress of this industry began only in 1924, he says, when about 24,000 domestic refrigerating units were in use. In 1925 production was three times as great as in 1924, with a total of 75,000 units, and it is estimated that this year the production total will rise to approximately 450,000 units.

In 1926 the total was 400,000, with a sales value of about one hundred and fifty million dollars, says Mr. Oppenheimer.

In addition to the demand for domestic refrigerating units, there are 250 industries in which electric refrigeration is being increasingly used. These include three million food stores, four hundred thousand ice cream parlors and soda water fountains, hotels, drug stores, markets, restaurants, groceries and others.


