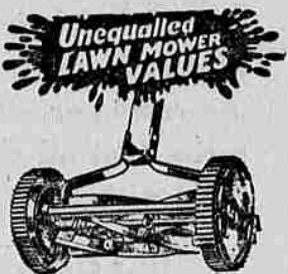

LOCAL AVIATOR UPSET IN LANDING AT GRANTS PASS

 GRANTS PASS, June 21.—After circling over the crowds watching the finish of the Redwood marathon, the commercial biplane piloted by H. R. Adams of Roseburg, with Carl Wiewiesiek, of Portland, as passenger, turned completely over when landing here this morning. Although the plane was damaged, neither of the fliers was hurt. The accident occurred after the plane was brought to the ground. A ditch, unseen by the pilot until too late to avoid, caught it and turned it over.
 Mr. Adams left Roseburg this morning to attend the marathon finish at Grants Pass and to do jitney work in that vicinity. On the way down he inspected the emergency landing field at Glendale. The plane which Mr. Adams was using was the Travelair biplane which he has been using in his local school and for jitney hops. From information received here, about the only damage done to the ship was the breaking of a portion of the landing gear.
