Hoover's Sister Is Not a Politician

Mrs. Leavitt Is Wife of California Painter.

SANTA MONICA, Calif., June 16.—Today, unknown.

But tomorrow, or in a couple of tomorrows, Mrs. Van Ness Leavitt may be standing full in the spotlight of the nation. Mrs. Leavitt has never tasted public life. She is content here in her obscure little cottage surrounded by shrubs and flowers. Being famous holds sort of a terror for her. Yet, at present, she can think of little else than brother Herbert Hoover's presidential campaign.

Mrs. Leavitt would rather have her green cottage than all the mansions in the country, but she would so like to address her letters to brother Herb to the White House in Washington.

Until she married Van Ness Leavitt, a Stanford University student, in 1899, Mrs. Leavitt was May Hoover, youngest of the three Hoover children, being two years younger than Herbert—Bert, she calls him. For the last 16 years Mrs. Leavitt has lived in or near Santa Monica, her husband being in the painting business here. Her 21-year-old son is a radio expert.

Son Married Recently

"We had hoped that the boy would go to Stanford, but he got married a few months ago so that eliminates any possibility of college now," Mrs. Leavitt says, with a note of regret in her voice.

"What does your son think of being nephew to a possible president of the United States?" I inquired.

"He doesn't think much about it," replied the boy's mother. "He doesn't talk much and least of all about Bert because he doesn't want people to think that he wants

to bask in Bert's prominence. If you want him to talk, you have to get him on the subject of radio.

"I don't see what good it is going to do Bert for me to have all this publicity in the papers," continues Mrs. Leavitt. "But if it will help him any, I am willing to do what I can. It is the only reason I stand for it though, particularly having my picture published."

"No, I am not going to do any campaigning. I haven't even been in club work for a number of years. There's nothing I can do now to help get votes, except to cast my own. That certainly will be for Bert. I think most of our friends here will vote for him too, but I am not going to try to persuade them to do so."

In her late fifties now, Mrs. Leavitt is having an otherwise peaceful life constantly interrupted by inquisitive reporters. It is now to her and she doesn't quite know what to do about it. However, if it will help brother Herb—well, that's all that is necessary.

Is Fond of Housework

The presidential candidate's sister has more fun through doing housework, trimming her shrubs, working in the garden, cooking, looking for her husband and wondering what night her son and his wife will drop in for a short visit.

"I must get that radio fixed so that it will work all right during the convention at Kansas City," she remarked as the program to which we were listening suddenly stopped coming in. "There's something wrong with it now, but I must be able to listen to everything that goes on at the convention."

NEW SUPER SERVICE STATION PLANNED
