with a characteristic counter-charge—the lunge of a wounded wildcat.

Fighters Gory Sight

His big opportunity came, Walker never thereafter was able to beat back Hudkins' wild rushes or prevent Ace from boring in. Burying his bloody head in Walker's shoulder and whaling away with both fists, Hudkins forced the fight throughout the last five rounds. Occasionally his head was jolted back by Walker's left. His face was a mask of blood, oozing from cuts over both eyes, but he refused to be tamed. Walker, constantly in retreat and unable to shake off his persistent foe, struggled and clinched, squirmed and dodged out of corners as Ace flayed body and head ceaselessly.

For undiluted savagery, continual and slashing action, the bout has had few parallels. Walker was cut in the nose in the first round and over the left eye in the second. Ace started to bleed in the third from Walker's ripping hooks. By the end of the fifth both were crimson, grotesque figures in the downpour as they slipped and punched, splashed and slugged around on canvas that sagged and held several inches of water.

Hudkins, the aggressor from the start, was warned several times for holding, pinning, Walker's arms and slugging with whichever hand happened to be free. These tactics perhaps were counted by the two judges against Hudkins, thus helping the score in Walker's favor. Walker landed the sharper, more effective blows when he could wrest himself free to land them—but Hudkins landed oftener. The Ace was always willing to take a few cracks on the chin in order to get in close, flail away with both hands and stay there. In one round, the seventh, Hudkins got his tumbled head buried in Mickey's shoulder and kept it there the full three minutes, forcing Mickey from one side of the ring to the other and swinging both hands constantly. There seemed no limit to Hudkins' powers of endurance.

McLarin K. O.'s McGraw NEW YORK, June 22.—Snailing Jimmy McLarin, who enthroned himself in the hearts of New York fight fans in his first eastern appearance by a crashing one round knockout of Sid Terris, Manhattan's own ghost of the ghetto, has come back to his throne. After a month spent in the shade cast by the terrific drubbing he received at the hands of the lightweight champion, Sammy Mandell, Jimmy made a success of his comeback last night by stopping Phil McGraw after only two minutes, 45 seconds of the first round.

Travelling McGraw, one of the toughest battlers in his class, one whose jaw had never been found

vulnerable in over a hundred fights. Jimmy landed three times with his good right mauler, and each time scored a clean knock down. After the fourth time the Detroit florist went to the canvas. Referee Jack Dorman led McLarin to a neutral corner in token of a technical knockout.

FARM REMINDERS

Small grains and grasses are out for hay in Oregon. Not later than the soft dough stage for highest grade product, says the experiment station. As a general rule, the right time for cutting most kinds of hay is just before it loses its green color.

Hay of good quality is frequently reduced in market value because bales are ragged in appearance or are so poorly tied as to be easily broken, Oregon specialists find. Any musty or moldy hay from the stack allowed to go into the bales raises a question in the mind of the buyer or inspector as well.

Fluid in the abdominal cavity of laying fowls is not an indication of a contagious disease, says the poultry pathologist of the experiment station. This material is found not uncommonly when eggs or parts of eggs have been misplaced. Losses from this source are expected in connection with the 10 to 15 per cent mortality usually accepted by commercial poultrymen as normal for the first laying year.

Little excuse remains now-a-days for an insect-eaten garden. Most of the common vegetable insects can be readily controlled with standard poison dusts. Methods are described in full in Oregon experiment station circular 65 sent free on request.

When farmers are in doubt as to what fertilizers are best for vegetable growing in their locality, it is better to send details concerning the soil and nature of previous crops than to send a soil sample for analysis to the experiment station, says A. G. Bouquet in a recent bulletin, "The Farm Vegetable Garden."
