TUNNEL BEING
DRIVEN UNDER
DETROIT RIVER**\$23,000,000 Vehicular Bore
to Connect Canada and
United States.**

SHORE SPANS RISING

**Millions Additional Will
Be Spent for Several
Bridges to Unite
Two Countries.**

DETROIT, June 22.—(A. P.)—A new link piercing the water boundary between the United States and Canada will soon be forged.

The first under water vehicular tunnel ever built to connect two nations is being laid beneath the Detroit river between Detroit and Windsor, Ont., and what is called the world's largest steel bridge—the Ambassador International bridge—is to join the border cities in their first shore-to-shore roadway.

These two projects represent a \$49,000,000 expression of faith in the good will between the countries.

Two other international bridges, one across the Detroit river and the other to span the St. Clair river between Port Huron, Mich., and Sarnia, Ont., await only final governmental approval. The cost of the two projects will approximate \$9,000,000.

Huge Dredges At Work

Giant dredges with seven-ton buckets have begun eating into the opposite shores of the Detroit river to prepare for the \$23,000,000 vehicular tunnel, which will be financed with Canadian and United States capital.

The big tube is to be made of steel and reinforced concrete and is to rest thirty feet below the river at the harbor line. Contracts

call for its completion in thirty months.

The subway will be brilliantly illuminated and equipped with signals, telephones and a sidewalk for officers controlling and supervising traffic. It will have all modern safety devices similar to those used in the Holland tunnel in New York.

Vehicles will be permitted to travel 30 miles an hour, both ways. It is planned to provide continuous bus service between the terminals in Detroit and Windsor.

First sections of the Ambassador International bridge, which, with the tunnel will largely supplant ferry service between Detroit and Windsor, have been put in place. Mammoth towers to stand at the base of the bridge on either side of the border have begun to soar upward on opposite sides of the river.

The bridge will be 55 feet wide, with a roadway sufficient to accommodate five separate lanes of traffic. It is to be a 1,850-foot span and will stand 150 feet above the water to permit shipping craft to pass underneath it. The estimated cost is \$26,000,000.

Legislative approval is being sought for a second international bridge across the Detroit river between Amherstburg, Ont., and Grosse Ile. It would be ten spans of 250 feet each and would stand 150 feet above the water and cost between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. Plans have been drawn for the structure.

Congress has authorized construction of the Port Huron-Sarnia bridge over the St. Clair river. It is to cost \$4,000,000.

County Camp.**

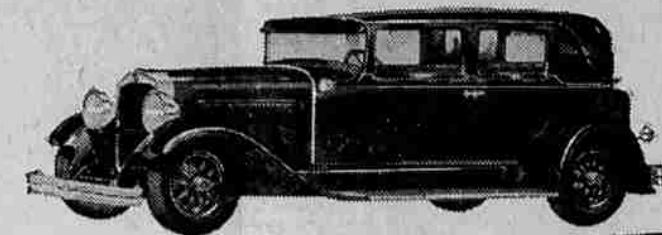
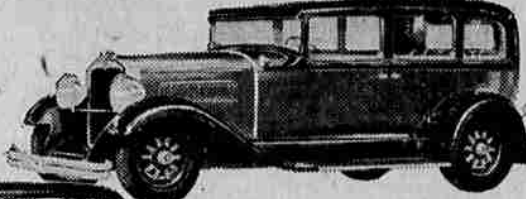
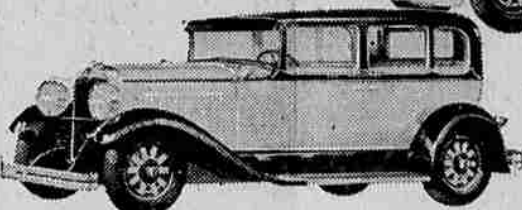
The daily program to be followed during the Boy Scout camp at Wolf Creek beginning July second has been worked out and was announced by E. A. Britton, executive, as follows: 6:30 a. m., first call; 6:32 fall in, flag raising and setting up exercises; 7:30, breakfast; 9:00, Scoutcraft instruction, half-hour classes until eleven o'clock; 11:00, morning swim, swimming instruction; 12:00, dinner; 1:00 p. m., rest period; 2:00, games, hikes, exploration trips; 4:00, afternoon swim; 5:30 tent inspection; 6:00, supper; 7:00, games or study (free time); 8:30, campfire program; 9:30, to bed, all lights out and quiet.

Overnight hikes, patrol hikes and possibly troop hikes or trips will be worked in with the regular program. As in the past the first week will be given over principally to advancement in Scoutcraft.

"The summer camp is the biggest adventure of Scouting in the year for the boy," Mr. Britton says. "Parents should consider it in that light and put themselves in his shoes. The supervised but free, healthy outdoor life and the group influence mean much to a boy in his teens."

associated with boys who are pledged as Scouts to keep themselves physically strong and morally straight.

"The boy will look for his many interests—good eating, hiking, swimming, campfires, fellowship and a chance to advance in Scouting rank and efficiency. The interests of the parents are health, safety, wise leadership, uplifting influence and wholesome recreation."

"These interests are all pledged both to the boy and parent. The safety of the boy while swimming is a very important item to the parents. At Wolf Creek the swimming area is roped off into zones known as safety zones. Boys must keep within the bounds designated for them, depending upon their swimming ability. Half way out is a safety raft, with a qualified life saver aboard and on duty with a life preserver. Up on the twenty-foot tower is another life guard who can see everything in the pool very clearly. Then at one corner is another life guard with a small life preserver for use in throwing to any one who might need just a little help. In addition to these precautions, each Scout has a buddy and is to look out for him at all times. If at any time during the swim he misses his buddy and does not locate him at once he is to give immediate notice. Before the boys go into the water they turn over their 'paddle' with the red side out. As soon as they come out they turn the white side out. Every few minutes during the swim a 'check-up' is made to make sure and certain that none of the safety devices have failed. No boy is forced to go in to swim. No ducking or pushing is permitted. It is a known fact that persons have died from heart attacks during swimming. That is one reason why boys are required to go to a doctor for examination before coming to camp. It serves to safeguard the boy, the parents and the camp directors and to the greater happiness of all."

"The Scout executive will be in his office all day tomorrow and will be glad to talk the matter over with parents and receive applications for camp. Application blanks may be had at the Economy Grocery and left there for registration. It is thought that the camp will be filled within a very few days."

Dabe Ruth seems to have run the scale in baseball experiences now that, after 15 years, he finally has watched a home run vanish from the records in a rainstorm. He poked his twenty-sixth in among the atterage passengers in right field at the Yankee Stadium yesterday, but it was washed from the books when the second half of a Yankee-Atlantic double header was halted by rain.

Young Henry Johnson, Yankee recruit, gave the Athletics their second 1928 shut-out in the first game, 4 to 0, and enabled the Yankees to lengthen their lead to nine and one half games.

Guerrilla war made along the rest of the American league front saw the Red Sox turn the tables on the Senators, 9 to 12, while Cleveland was dividing another double header with the lowly White Sox on the Indian reservation. The Indians won the first, 4 to 2, and the White Sox the second, 4 to 3, with an amazing three-run rally in the ninth.

Chicago's even break coupled with Detroit's double reverse in St. Louis sent the Tigers to within half a game of last place, the Browns won, 8 to 3 and 9 to 5, as Schang, Blue and Bettencourt hit home runs.

The torrid National league race, which showed signs of disintegrating under the incessant pounding of the Cardinals, netted a slight gain for the runner-up Reds yesterday. The Rhinelanders nosed out the Pirates, 5 to 4.

Sheriff Fred Blake had to turn in a two-hit game to win from St. Louis in the opener 1-2, and Charlie Root was altogether unable to cope with the Cardinal stampede in the nightcap, which went to the visitors, 4 to 1.

The Giants finally swung into action at Boston, after suffering five postponements in their first six scheduled appearances. In the hub, Fred Fitzsimmons hurled the clan McGraw to a handsome victory by 9 to 4, in the first brush.

Benton ran into a very fine bit of box work by Arthur Delaney, and the Giants had to be satisfied with a 3 to 1 defeat in the second game.

Millions Expended for Recreation

American Cities, in Year, Double Appropriations For Sports and Playgrounds—Three Kinds of Ball Games, Horseshoe Pitching and Soccer Most Popular; Tennis, Swimming, Golf Next.

NEW YORK, June 22.—(A. P.)—An expenditure of \$32,191,763 for municipal recreation in 1927, as contrasted with \$19,200,000 in 1926 and \$9,317,000 four years before, is revealed in the annual year book of recreation statistics for the United States and Canada published by the Playground and Recreation association of America.

Nearly half the 1927 outlay was for the purchase of land, buildings and permanent equipment.

Bond issues for recreation from 1923 to 1927 inclusive totaled \$47,106,618, including \$11,960,200 last year. The number of cities reporting recreational facilities under leadership rose from 505 in 1922 to 815 in 1927. Of the latter number, 321 have year round supervision of recreation.

How Sports Rank

Baseball on public diamonds is falling behind the pace of growth of some other sports. From 1924 to 1927 the number of baseball players doubled, but that of playground ball players tripled, while basketball showed nearly four times as many players. Last year 249,214 enrolled in playground ball as against 219,299 in baseball. The number of teams in the six most popular municipal sports last year were as follows: playground ball, 16,128; basketball, 14,676; basketball, 13,052; volleyball, 6,173; horseshoes, 4,901; and soccer, 3,493.

Of more than twenty-five million spectators at municipal sports, fifteen million attended baseball games.

Tennis courts increased by 723 and swimming pools by 147 over the 1926 totals. Enthusiasm for golf hit the municipal pocketbook to the extent of 69 new courses last year.

Supply Inadequate

Children's playgrounds and baseball diamonds, however, are not increasing rapidly enough to take care of the child population, according to the Playground and Recreation association. No city has enough playgrounds, and the lack of baseball diamonds is blamed in part at least for the relatively slow growth of baseball as compared with some of the other sports.

The insufficient number of playgrounds helps to account for the increasing death toll of children at play in city streets, says the association.

Model aircraft construction and flying, a new activity on public playgrounds, was reported last year by 128 communities.
