

CAROL'S EX-WIFE WILL DEVOTE LIFE TO 6-YEAR KING

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 22.—Free of her wayward husband, former Crown Prince Carol, Princess Helen intends to devote her life to her adopted country and to making a good king of her six-year-old son, Michael.

Although the decree of divorce from Carol whom she married in 1921 was absolute and she is free to remarry, she does not intend to do so.

Princess Helen showed no signs of exultation when informed that her petition had been granted. She seemed instead to be stricken with sorrow at the position of exile and ostracism into which Carol has been plunged since he eloped with Magda Lupescu in 1925.

Carol may appeal within five days on the ground of incompetency of the court, but his lawyers said after the divorce was granted that appeal would be futile. Neither Carol nor Princess Helen was present at the proceedings.

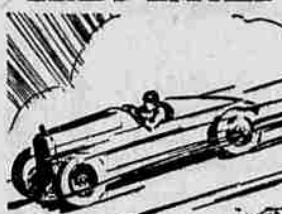

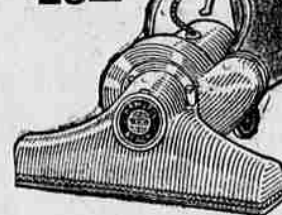

Whatever might have been the matter with Kansas a generation ago will have been dispelled and forgotten when the full effect of her supreme court's decision opening the way for banishing all billboards and advertising signs from the state highways becomes apparent.

Away with automobile signs and

oil advertising and cigarette posters and bathing beauties (although we realize that bathing suit pictures in Kansas denote almost a divine faith in the power of advertising) and breakfast food and beer sign posts in the good state of Kansas.

Kansas, of course, hasn't much scenic beauty, but she evidently believes in guarding jealously what she has. Kansas is a state of roll-

ing plains and great level stretches where the eye of man finds room for the full play of its penetrating power. There are growing crops and big red barns and large white houses, all of which spell prosperity and contentment despite those McNary-Haugen days. Other Presidential Campaigns—1924

The republican national convention of 1924 met at Cleveland, June 10, and nominated President Coolidge as its candidate on the first ballot. In choosing a vice presidential nominee, however, a situation arose which had never been faced before. The party selected Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, and he declined. Then it picked Charles Gates Dawes of the same state.

The democrats met in Madison Square Garden, New York, on June 24, in what became the longest convention ever held by any political party. William Gibbs McAdoo and Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York were leaders for the nomination, but neither could muster two-thirds of the delegates. Those pledged to favorite sons, including Senator Oscar Underwood of Alabama and John W. Davis of West Virginia, held fast to their candidates. On the one hundred and third ballot Davis was nominated, and Charles W. Bryan, governor of Nebraska and brother of William Jennings Bryan, was made his running mate.

The republican ticket was victorious by a popular plurality over the democrats of nearly 7,000,000 votes, notwithstanding the candidacy on a progressive ticket of Senator Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin. The electoral vote was Coolidge 382, Davis 136, La Follette 13.

A Quarter Century of Auto Evolution.



Only a little more than a quarter century old, the "buggy" shown in this picture has been consigned as a historic relic to the Smithsonian Institution. Alongside the comfortable bus, it shows how fast the auto has progressed. It is the first product of what is now the White Motor Company of Cleveland—a White-Stanhope stageman. The bus is the last word in White design.
