

BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Rain, hail and high winds failed to halt the march of the Cards in Chicago yesterday, but the unruly weather did succeed in blasting sunny Jim Bottomley's sixteenth home run from him—much after the fashion in which Babe Ruth's twenty-sixth was destroyed at the Yankee Stadium on the previous afternoon.

Bottomley's homer was delivered in the first half of the seventh against Perce Malone with Frank Frisch on base, but the score reverted to the sixth when rain made further play impossible. The cards won by a 4 to 1 instead of 6 to 1, and place the series county at three games to one in their favor.

The victory sent the Cards spinning another turn upward yesterday as the Reds crumpled under the drive of the Pirates in Pittsburgh, 11 to 1. Burleigh Grimes pitched at top speed throughout.

Cold weather, on the second day of summer, forced the Robins and the Braves into idleness at Boston, while rain followed the Giants to Philadelphia.

Rain also stepped in and saved one team or the other at the Yankee Stadium, where the Athletics were scheduled to appear.

The Red Sox and the Senators put up a snappy pitchers' battle in practical privacy at Washington, with Bob Burke, Senator recruit, shading Charlie Ruffing to win, 1 to 0.

The White Sox took a hard poke at the ailing George Uhle in Cleveland to win by 7 to 4, while the Tigers escaped a tie for the cellar by corraling the second game in St. Louis, 12 to 6, after losing the first, 8 to 3.

INCREASE MADE IN PROTECTION FUND FOR FORESTS

An increase in allotments for federal cooperation with states in forest fire control, of \$20,770 for Oregon and \$21,700 for Washington, is announced by the forest service office at Portland, Oregon. These increases, which bring the amounts up to \$65,012 in Oregon and \$89,155 in Washington, are made possible by an increase of \$200,000 in the total congressional appropriation for all states carried by the last agricultural appropriation bill. The total now stands at \$1,200,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

About one-third of this total increase will come to the western states, where the funds are used to build up adequate organizations for fire detection and suppression on privately-owned timber lands, under the Clark-McNary act of 1924, which recognizes the principle that government, state, and private owner each has a definite responsibility in forest protection. This 1924 act therefore covers the protection from fire of state and private forest lands only, and is entirely apart from national forest protection which is cared for under separate appropriations.

The government amounts now available are estimated to cover slightly less than one-fourth of the cost, in Oregon, of fire prevention, and \$2500 below one-fourth in Washington, the remaining cost being supplied by the states and timber land owners. Both states are working toward adequate systems of protection for all state and privately-owned forest lands. Under this plan the costs would be met by a three-way division, the federal government and the state bearing one-half the expense and the landowners bearing the other half.

Timber is a long-time crop which requires that owners of cut-over lands have assistance in their protection during the time the lands are non-productive. In a region where there is danger of forest fires spreading over large areas, as is the case in most forested regions, an individual owner is helpless in protecting his holdings independently, and it is to encourage organized protective methods as well as to have the public bear a part of the cost that the Clark-McNary act was passed in 1924. Thirty-five states are now co-operating with the federal government under this act.

TUNNEY GOING TO IRELAND

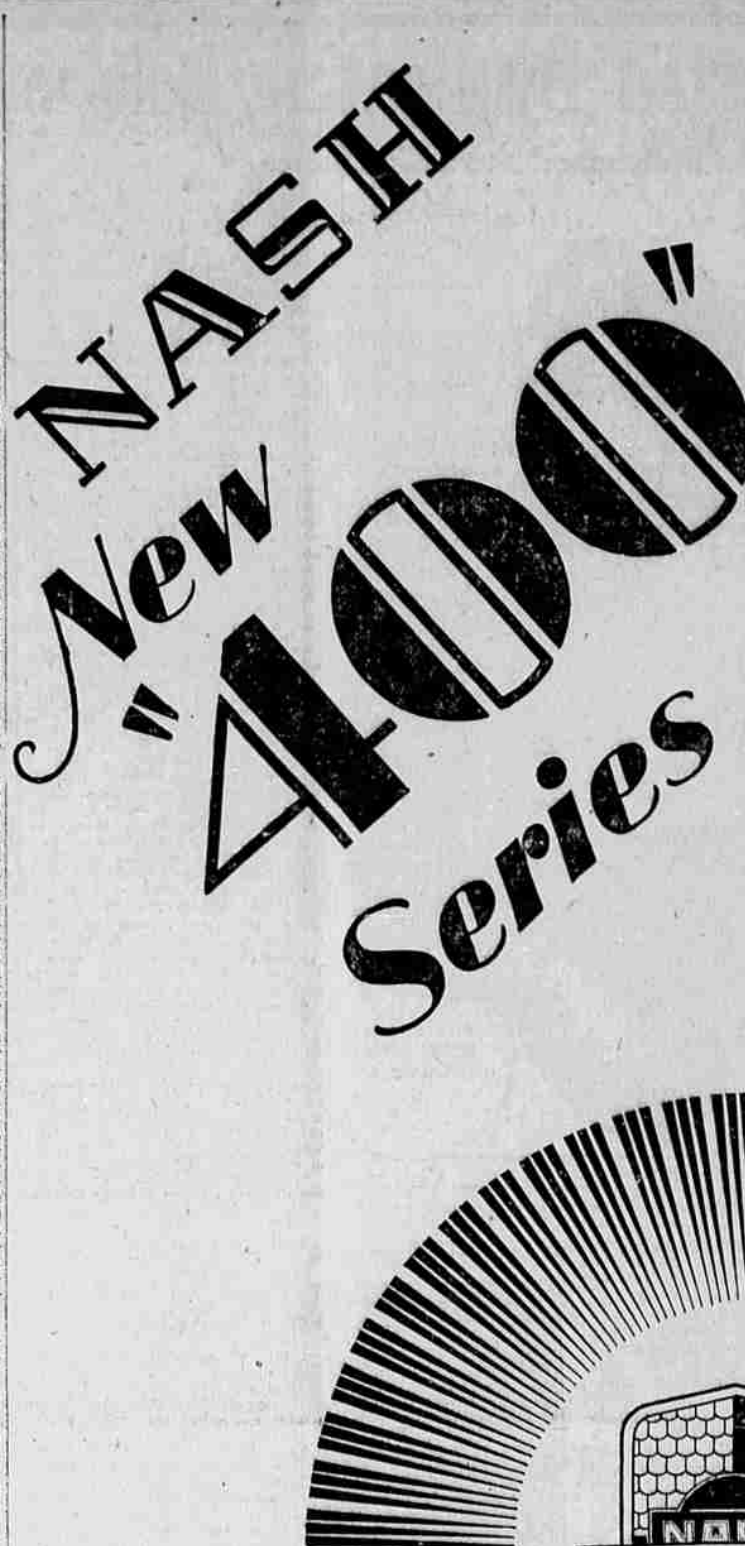

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BOBBY JONES HAS LONGER LEAD IN GOLFING MATCH

OLYMPIA FIELDS, CHICAGO, June 23.—Shooting a 73, two over par, Bobby Jones increased his lead in the national open golf

championship today. Added to his 144 he had a 54 hole total of 217, five strokes ahead of his nearest rivals, George von Elm and Johnny Farrell, each 222.

MAORIAS HONOR HEENEY WITH ROBE TO WEAR IN RING

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 23.—On their way to see their brother's attempt to uncrown Gene Tunney, world's heavyweight king, three brothers of Tom Heeney arrived here from Australia, enroute to New York.

They brought with them a cloak, a suit of the Maorians, natives of New Zealand, to Tom, to wear when he enters the ring for the title bout. Heeney will be the fourth white person to be so honored by the natives. Others to receive a Maori cloak are the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York and a girl entrant in the Olympic games from New Zealand.

The brothers, Jack, Patrick and Arthur, today were reluctant to discuss Tom's chances, but talked freely of the beginning of his career when he gave up plumping for the prize ring after knocking out a gigantic bushwacker in an open tournament in 1914. It was Tom's first fight, he being drawn into the contest at Gisborne, N. Z., at 15 years of age by lack of material.

PRISONER FAILS AT PORTLAND IN ESCAPE ATTEMPT

PORTLAND, June 23.—Breaking from a deputy sheriff at the county court house doors today, Charles Boggs, convicted bootlegger, was halted by a shot from the officer. As he hesitated in his flight when Deputy B. Z. fired, a pedestrian tripped Boggs and other officers grabbed him as he scrambled to his feet.
