CAN WE LIVE ALONE?

Even the most selfish, secluded man cannot live wholly to himself. His life inevitably will be an influence in the life of his community and will have an effect on others whether he wills it or not. This was the theme on which Dr. John Grier Hibben, president of Princeton University, addressed the graduating class of that institution the other day. "At the very beginning of your careers," Dr. Hibben said, "it is imperative that you should recognize that your life is not detached from your world, that you do not dare to exploit the world about you, using it wholly for your own purposes as a man uses a machine which he operates as an instrument and yet is in no way identified with it." One wonders how deeply that went home to the youthful graduates, many of whom will shortly dedicate themselves to the lives of ornamental and useless leisure to which their fathers' wealth entitles them. Whether they paid any attention to it or not, it is profoundly true; as true of Princeton graduates as of factory hands, sailors and air mail pilots. All of us might map our lives a little more wisely if we only realized it. Suppose a man sets out to live for himself alone; can he succeed? He may apply himself industriously to business, say, mapping every action solely by the possible effect on his own fortunes; but in spite of himself he will give a certain amount of color to his community. His surroundings will be just a trifle different than they would be if he were not there. He may shut his eyes and ears to the outside world if he will, but the lives of other men will inevitably be affected by his existence. Modern psychology is more and more coming to the conclusion that man is influenced chiefly by his environment. Yet what is one's environment? Simply the sum total of the lives of the men with whom one comes in contact. If a man's life is shaped by his environment, he at the same time forms part of the environment which governs his fellows. Trouble comes from our refusal to face this fact. The man who ignores the prohibition law and buys bootleg liquor is not performing an act that concerns himself alone; he is adding his mite to the country's complacent disrespect for all law. The man who shrugs his shoulders and forgets to cast his vote on election day is helping the political bosses to maintain their seats. No man can live to himself alone. The sooner we recognize this the sooner we can move forward to a common life of greater freedom.
