ROBT. W. STEWART AGAIN INDICTED

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Robert W. Stewart, head of the Indiana Standard Oil company, was indicted on three counts of perjury today as the result of his Continental Trading company testimony before the senate oil committee.

It was the same testimony (U. S. caused John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to demand his resignation as chairman of the corporation's board of directors.

Nearly "All For Al" By BYRON PRICE. Associated Press Staff Writer.

HOUSTON, June 25.—The convention position of Alfred E. Smith in democratic councils here became so apparent as assembling delegates compared notes today that the old familiar call of the band wagon sounded in the streets of Houston even a day ahead of the opening of the national convention.

There were signs of great preoccupation in some of the state delegations who are pledged to support favorite sons on the first ballot. Fearful lest a nomination should be made before they had an opportunity to swing over to the New York governor, several important state blocs carefully pondered what should be done.

Smith managers have said they did not want a first ballot nomination but would rather see the favorite sons all get a run for their money. They maintained today that they had nothing whatever to do with the latest Smith acclamation so far as the initial roll call was concerned but, on the other hand, were so anxious to let everybody run that they might ask Maryland to vote first for Ritchie instead of Smith in order to delay the decision.

Oklahoma, caucusing late this afternoon found herself in a key position. Her delegation of twenty is uninstructed and came out of a state convention jointly controlled by Smith and Reed partisans. Should these twenty turn to Smith it admittedly would mean the definite collapse of the attempt to build up a considerable strength against him.

Dry Plank Drafted Representatives of 21 national dry organizations today drafted a plank for submission to the resolutions committee of the convention calling for the nomination of candidates openly committed by "their utterances, acts and records" to a positive enforcement of the 18th amendment and its supporting laws.

On convening at noon tomorrow, the convention after the making of various committees has been announced, will recess until 7 p. m. Central Standard Time. Shortly after that hour Claude G. Bowers, as temporary chairman, will deliver his keynote address.

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FAVORITE SON DELEGATIONS SWING TO AL SMITH

So far, it appears to be the strategy of the band of southerners who are underdetermined to be counting strongly on the support of Gov. Moody of Texas, to have votes kept in line for Representative Hall of Tennessee; Senator George of Georgia; Evans Woolen of Indiana and other favorite sons. No one man has been determined upon, as their candidate with all attention centered now on stopping Smith.

Reed Explains Views In his statement, Senator Reed stressed honesty in government as the "great issue" and called particular attention to his effort to stop repeal of the state enforcement law of Missouri, "because such repeal would have deprived the people of the protection of the state officers and courts and to a large extent given immunity to the bootleggers who infest and curse many parts of the land."

Senator Reed, after specifying his original objection to the eighteenth amendment declared: "But when the constitution was amended it became the supreme law of the land. When the Volstead Act was passed it became the statute law. And constitution and law became binding upon all citizens and public officials. Similarly the duty devolved it upon the states to support honestly the constitution. Just as it entitles them to its protection and benefits."

"In my opinion, the 18th amendment will stand until and unless the moral forces of the nation become convinced that there is some better way to deal with the liquor problem."

"My entire public life ought to make it unnecessary for me to say what I now do say: That if I am elected president I will keep the oath of office fully and impartially seek to enforce the laws of the land and defend the constitution against all enemies, foreign and domestic."

Smith Camp Victory HOUSTON, June 25.—On its first roll call vote the Democratic national committee today voted 76 to 14 to place on the temporary roll of the national convention six Smith pledged delegates from the Central Standard Oil company, which was headed by Mrs. L. O. Keen, the national committeewoman from that possession.
