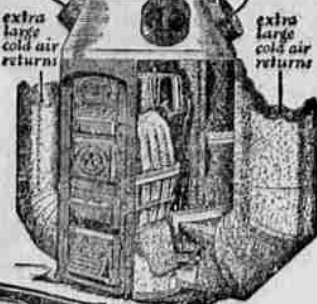

Great Festival to Honor Schubert

Seventy Thousand Choralists From All Parts of World and Great Host of Others Assembling in Vienna to Participate in Program, Which Required Years' Work For Its Completion.

VIENNA, June 25.—Singers from all over the world are gathering in Vienna to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the death of Franz Peter Schubert, composer of some of the world's finest classical songs. It was in November, 1828, that Schubert died in Vienna, but the celebrations in honor of his memory and genius begin many months in advance of that date and will last throughout the year.

The principal feature of the celebration will be a monster congregation of Austrian, German, Polish, American and other singers from July 19 to 23. No less than 70,000 choralists will crowd into the vast concert hall in the environs of Vienna, which has been specially built for the occasion, while an additional 50,000 choralists will gather outside the hall to participate in the mighty tribute of song to Austria's great master of melody. Several hundred singing societies in the United States will send delegates.

Living in poverty and obscurity at the age of 32, Schubert's genius remained unrecognized for half a century. The Austrian government

and Austrian musical societies decided therefore to make this year's anniversary of the death of "The King of Song" one of the most impressive in modern times. With funds supplied partly by the Vienna municipal government and partly by Austrian singing societies, an immense structure of wood has been erected in one of the public parks, which will seat 70,000 singers.

This gigantic festival will open with the singing by 120,000 voices of Schubert's famous hymn, beginning with the words, "Oh, God Almighty, hear our prayers." Special phonograph-recording apparatus will preserve in disc form this unique example of community singing, while the radio will carry the chorus virtually to every corner of the world, including the United States.

These exercises will be followed by a great parade through the streets of Vienna of half a million persons eager to do homage to the man whose life was one of struggle and hardship, but whose heritage to mankind was a prodigious contribution of 600 songs. Led by minstrels, troubadours, bards and

meistersingers, dressed in ancient, medieval and modern costume of the most splendid beauty, the half-million paraders will march down the famous Ringstrasse chanting hymns to the memory and genius of the immortal Schubert as they go.

To bring such a throng of visitors to Vienna the government called upon Germany, Poland and other neighboring countries for assistance. The German government will furnish 120 special non-stop trains to bring Germany's 60,000 guests to the Austrian capital. The German war office will supply 60,000 bedsteads, mattresses and linen, 100 complete army field kitchens and dishes, knives, forks and table linen for 75,000 persons.

Of the 120,000 visiting singers, 60,000 will be quartered in private houses, 40,000 in public buildings and the rest in hotels and huts spread over nine towns in the country. It has required the entire time of 400 committeemen and four years' work to complete arrangements for the ceremonies. The printing of the music for the singers required 14 months' incessant labor in the government printing plant.

To commemorate the Schubert centennial further, the government will issue special silver coins, paper money, postage stamps, postcards and other memorials. Reduced railroad and steamship fares will be made throughout Austria in order to attract visitors to the celebrations.

Prominent Women Visitors at Houston Guests of Southern Folk; Two Have Planks.

HOUSTON, June 25.—Plans for the inevitable social events attendant upon the arrival of many distinguished feminine guests for the democratic national convention superseded the more business-like political discussion today in women's circles.

Battle lines have been pretty well laid by the early male arrivals and the women feel they can now devote themselves partially to the entertainment devices that must of necessity fall upon their shoulders.

Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, who arrived in Houston yesterday just in time to be the guest of honor at the dedication ceremonies at the new Convention Hall and to be the first to sign the register at the hospitality house, will be given breakfast tomorrow morning by the daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. A. B. Foster of the local chapter is in charge of the arrangements while Mrs. Court Norton of the Colonial Dames will present the late president's widow with a corsage of orchids.

Mrs. Alfred E. Smith, whose arrival at noon today was awaited eagerly by both supporters of her husband's candidacy and those opposed to him, will accept only one of the many invitations extended her and that also will be a breakfast affair, tendered by the local committee on entertainment under the direction of Mrs. J. O. Ross of Houston.

Mrs. Emily Newell Blair, national committeewoman from Missouri and outgoing vice chairman of the national committee, will be guest of honor with Mrs. Wilson at a breakfast Wednesday given by the National Democratic Women's club of which she is president.

Mrs. Mabel Vernon, executive secretary, announced that Mrs. Mary Murray, a subway ticket changer in New York, would arrive some time today to lead the fight of the women's party to have the women's constitutional amendment plank inserted in the democratic national platform.

An early convention arrival was Miss Belle Sherwin, president of the National League of Women Voters. She has already begun to muster her forces to storm the platform committee in the interest of the five point plank the league advocates.

EX-PRINCE CAROL STILL HOPES FOR RECONCILIATION

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 25.—Former Crown Prince Carol hopes that his six-year old son, King Michael, will some day annul the decrees of divorce that Michael's mother, Princess Helen, obtained last week.

In a communication to his lawyers, Carol said he had never abandoned hope that he and his wife might become reconciled. He asserted it was a source of grief and pain to him to be separated from King Michael, whom he loves dearly.

Since he was exiled from Rumania, Carol said he had led a miserable life. The Italianhaired Magda Lupescu, with whom he was divorced in 1925 and who has been his companion since then, was his only source of consolation, he wrote. He asserted she has treated him like a brother.

Carol appealed to his son because he has no faith in the Rumanian courts. He rejected the offer of the court to allow him to appeal from a divorce decision. He considered that divorce to be not as well as illegal in other ways.

JOHNNY FARRELL NOW GOLF CHAMP OF UNITED STATES

CHICAGO, June 25.—Johnny Farrell, newly crowned open golf champion of the United States at the age of 27, steps forth today to survey his kingdom, reap the \$50,000 prize that goes with it and take his place as the third figure in the greatest triumvirate of shot makers America has ever had.

The slim young Irishman with the contagious smile and the fancy sweaters beat the master marksmen of this trio yesterday, Bobby Jones, king of the amateurs, in a spectacular 36-hole play for the championship, 143 to 144. He outstroked the other, debonair Walter Hagen, the day before in the final half of the 72-hole competition that left him and Jones deadlocked at 294 strokes each with Hagen in a tie for fourth at 296. Thus, out of the battle over the rugged number four links of the famous Olympic Fields layout, Farrell, from what seemed a hopeless chase after his first 36 holes, came back with a lead as Bobby slipped and skidded on his final round. With the big chance before him in the play off, Farrell met the final test of championship caliber.

Jones, on the last two holes, shot two successive birdies, but could not break down Farrell's morale or gain a single stroke.

Negro Republic of Liberia Making Progress Under President King's Administration; Capital Needed

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

MONROVIA, Liberia, June 25.—President King has just entered upon his third term as chief executive of his little republic which had its beginning a century ago when the primitive sailing ship Elizabeth cast anchor off this rocky, palm-covered coast.

The sturdy negro pioneers who came to Africa on this tiny craft in search of liberty sailed under a single star. They sought liberty and called their new home Liberia.

For four years, until the Civil war in the United States, settlers of courage and intelligence continued to join the original colonists and took up unswervingly the battle against the jungle, against suspicious natives and unscrupulous slave traders.

And it was the work done by these intrepid settlers and their immediate descendants which made it possible for President King and his cabinet, made up largely of negroes educated in the United States, to bring about such marked economic changes in Liberia of recent years.

Rich in Minerals Road-building now is progressing on a large scale and transportation soon will be available to districts allegedly rich in petroleum, all sorts of precious and semi-precious minerals and even diamonds. More than 200 miles of modern highways have been completed.

Of Liberia's 45,000 square miles of territory virtually every acre is tillable. President King has

brought the capital to Liberia necessary to give agriculture and industry a start. Long staple cotton seed from the United States, planted on the governmental farm established by President King, has produced cotton which experts pronounce equal to, if not superior to the American product.

Sugar cane, coffee, rice and virtually all grains and fruits flourish in Liberia. Pineapples attain a weight of eight pounds.

Outside Capital Needed Forests of mahogany, ebony, to number about 20,000.

The efforts of President King and his associates in the government have been more successful than previous governments in attracting capital to the underdeveloped land. But only a start has been made in development.

Narrow gauge roads are needed to tap the bush country. Liberia has no railways at present. There is lack of capital everywhere to develop agriculture through the adoption of modern methods which the government is disclosing through its scientific work. Liberia has an estimated population of more than 2,000,000. Of these American Liberians are said
