THEA RASCHE AT QUEBEC TO START ATLANTIC FLIGHT

THREE RIVERS, Que., June 26.—Miss Thea Rasche and the monoplane North Star, purchased for her by Mrs. James A. Stillman, were at Cap de la Madeleine flying field near here today awaiting favorable weather for a flight to Europe.

The plane was flown here from Hadley Field, N. J., yesterday by Ulrich Koenemann, Miss Rasche's German mechanic who is to be her co-pilot on the flight. The German aviatik came on by train and was at the field when her plane arrived.

Officials of the airport stated that arrangements had been made to fuel the plane here fully for a

trans-Atlantic flight and they believed she would make no stop once she took off until she reached her destination, which probably would be Berlin.

Mrs. Stillman who became Miss Rasche's backer when the German girl broke off relations with her former backers, said in New York she was sorry the flight could not be made from American soil but that she couldn't be bothered any more by petty annoyances in this flight.

"I'm doing what I think American women want me to do for this German girl," she said.

France Establishes Ban on Easy Marriages
New Law Requires Residence of 21 Days and Publication of Banns for 8 Days.

PARIS, June 26.—Simultaneously with the tightening of the regulations covering the divorcing of foreigners by the French courts, the ministry of justice has issued instructions that greater attention must be paid to marriage laws.

This is proving somewhat costly to American lawyers in Paris and on the Riviera who have made a specialty of handling all the details of a French civil marriage on brief notice. In many cases which have been brought to the attention of the "procureur general" the necessary banns apparently have never been published, birth certificates have not been provided and in the case of divorced persons the extracts of the divorce court's decree have not been filed.

At considerable cost to clients lawyers have had marriages performed within twenty-four hours after the arrival of the parties in France, whereas the law calls for residence of twenty-one days and at least eight days open publications of banns.

Mayors have now been advised that all marriage returns are to be closely reviewed and in cases where the law has not been complied with the right of the ministry of justice to annul marriages will be exercised.

WOMAN, WHO WAS ONCE ARRESTED HERE, GIVEN LIFE

PORTLAND, June 26.—Mrs. Evelyn Rosencrantz, known better in Portland as Patricia Reid, adventuress, confidence woman and bad check passer, should never again have opportunity to ply her illegitimate trades. She has been committed to San Quentin penitentiary under the habitual criminal law of California, first woman ever committed under that act in that state.

The commitment was made a few days ago, almost six years after she escaped into the limelight here by appearing in a white robe at the old Star theatre to "expose" one Orlando E. Miller, self-styled psychologist who was then lecturing in another theatre a few steps away. She had previously been in his employ. It was, according to the police at that time, a case of "dog out dog," as Miller's record was said to be almost as odorous as was hers. Mayor Baker, Chief of Police Jenkins and Police Captain Harris issued orders to "move on." There was almost instant compliance with that decree, as Inspector Swennes of the bad check detail at headquarters had a sheet of worthless paper that would have brought almost certain conviction in the courts had the woman not left.

The trail of Mrs. Rosencrantz, who, in her late forties, is to put in the remainder of her life behind bars, is said to be littered with blasted lives, "shotgun" marriages, successful badger games, nameless children, depleted banks, accounts on other dark spots. Her known history, which covers only the last 15 years, is said to be one of the most sordid chapters in Pacific coast criminal annals.

The last escapade that brought her before the bar of justice was the passage of a \$100 worthless check upon C. A. Anderson, Oakland, Calif., garage man.

As to her son, E. H. Whyte, California parole officer, wrote a Portland friend: "Since her arrest her son was picked up by the Oakland police and when apprehended endeavored to make a get-away and was shot in the attempt. He is on his way to one of our federal institutions—also a check artist. Seems to be a chip off the old block."

Mrs. Rosencrantz, or Patricia Reid as she was better known, was arrested at one time in Roseburg upon the request of Astoria and Portland officers. In some manner she came into possession of an automobile, which was claimed by an Astoria man, and was also wanted for passing worthless checks. She was arrested here by S. W. Starnier, who was sheriff at that time and was kept at the Douglas hotel. A local attorney, who defended her case, came into possession of the car, which was disputed.

PEACH GROWERS OF CALIFORNIA ASK FLAT \$25 A TON

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Determined to fix the prices of the 1928 canning peach crop before the actual season opens the operating committee of the Canners League of California held an executive session here today. The committee had under consideration the demand for a flat price of \$25 a ton on number one peaches made by the canning peach growers association last week.

It was generally believed the canners held the price of \$25 for No. 1 grade and \$15 a ton for No. 2 peaches, without regard to pack, was too high.

12,000 ACRES OF LAKE COUNTY LAND TO BE OPENED UP

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Twelve thousand acres of land in Lake county, Lakeview land district, Oregon, will be opened to homestead and desert land entry by qualified ex-service men on July 13, and to general entry October 12.

The tract is near the town of Paisley and the nearest railroad towns are Kirk and Klamath Falls, on the Southern Pacific. The lands are suitable for grazing, but precipitation is not sufficient in average years for production of grain crops.

ROBT. W. STEWART DENIES GUILT OF PERJURY CHARGE

(Associated Press Local Wire)
WASHINGTON, June 26.—Robert W. Stewart, arraigned in the District of Columbia supreme court on charges of perjury today, pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for Oct. 8.

Frank J. Hogan, Stewart's counsel, insisted that the chairman of the board of the Indiana Standard Oil company, be placed on trial tomorrow, saying his client was innocent and sought an immediate hearing. Justice Frederick L. Siddons replied that the court was adjourning for a summer recess and the first available date for hearing the case was Oct. 8. Stewart was released under \$5,000 bond.

BELA KUN CAUSES CABINET CRISIS

VIENNA, June 26.—Franz Dinghofer, minister of justice, has resigned his post as an outgrowth of criticism regarding his refusal to permit the extradition of Bela Kun, communist, to Hungary.

It is believed that the entire cabinet will fall.

The fiery communist, who is being held in Austria on a charge of entering the country after having been expelled, caused a sensation in court today when he declared that the reason he had come to Austria was because the Third International had cumulative proof that Italy and Hungary were preparing for war against soviet Russia.

Other countries would be dragged into this war, said the erstwhile communist leader, and the "proletariat would be made fodder for their deities."

Bela Kun was defiant and almost insolent in his attitude toward his three judges.

BANK OF ITALY OFFICIAL DR. R. L. SEVIER, IS DEAD

LOS ANGELES, June 26.—Dr. R. L. Sevier, vice-president of the Bank of Italy and brother-in-law of A. P. Giannini, died at a hospital here late last night. He had been at the hospital six days. He leaves a widow and two children.

Dr. Sevier formerly was president of the California State Dental Board.
