Feathered Criminals

One of the greatest enemies of the angler is the cormorant. This ugly bird is a skilled fish catcher and has, moreover, a gourmand's appetite. A pair of these criminals will seriously deplete a trout stock in a very short time, if allowed to go unmolested.

Viciousness is associated with the eagles and vultures, although so often with the swan, although every one knows that it is a bad-tempered bird as a rule. There was recently a case, however, of a swan that attacked a man in a motor car. It broke the windshield, and then broke the driver's nose with a blow from its wing of such force that it rendered the man unconscious.

Ants Fight to Death

Extirpation of red-ant nests, one of the most common pests in Australia, frequently is effected by starting a war between these ants and warlike soldier ants. The war between the two varieties of ants is started by placing a large uncooked bone near the nest occupied by the red ants, and when they begin feeding, the bone is removed gradually nearer the nest of soldier ants, a writer in the Sydney Bulletin tells us. When the two tribes meet while attempting to obtain food from the same bone, open warfare follows, during which casualties become exceedingly heavy on both sides. Usually the battle ends in the complete extermination of one of the armies.

Varieties of Bread

Generally speaking, the difference between whole-wheat bread and graham bread is that there is less coarse bran in the so-called whole-wheat bread than in graham bread. True graham bread is made from graham flour, Dr. Alexander Graham was the first to advocate milling the entire wheat, adding nothing and subtracting nothing. In some mills the whole-wheat flour is a product of the whole wheat put through a process to take out the coarsest bran. Bakeries' graham bread is made from a mixture of pure graham flour and white flour, proportions varying—sometimes being half and half.

Only a Life Interest

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Food We All Like

WE ARE told that the average American eats at least one-third more food than he needs. If we could learn to stop eating before we have reached the stage of feeling stuffed, and masticate what we eat at least four times longer than we usually do, we would be fully satisfied with much less food. We would have less indigestion and headache and live more efficient and useful lives.

Eggs Chilled With Sausages.—Fric six sausages all over and place around the edge of a baking dish, cook in a hot oven until crisp and brown, pour off the fat and cut the sausages into inch pieces; break three fresh eggs in the center of the dish, pour over two tablespoonsful of fat and set into the oven to cook the eggs. Serve from the baking dish.

Banana Salad.—Take one cupful of thick cream, three tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, one-half teaspoonful of paprika and a teaspoonful of powdered sugar. Whip the cream, add the lemon juice gradually. Place peeled bananas on lettuce and pour over the dressing.

Okra Savory.—Take one quart of okra cut into quarter-inch slices crosswise, mix with two cupfuls of diced celery, one green pepper diced and one small onion chopped. Cook in four tablespoonfuls of fat until the vegetables begin to get soft. Add two large ripe tomatoes cut into pieces or the equivalent of stewed tomatoes. Simmer gently one hour. Serve hot.

Feather Cake.—Take one cupful of sugar, one cupful of milk, two and one-half cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one tablespoonful of butter and a pinch of salt. Mix and beat well. Bake in a loaf.

Veal Pie.—Cook a piece of the neck of veal—cook until tender—with a piece of salt pork. Cut into bits and arrange in a baking dish, add cream, seasonings, cover with crust and bake until brown.

Fraud Practiced on Devotees of Buddha

When the Oriental wishes to produce pearl images of Buddha, after inserting his wooden wedge, he carefully forced the mantle for a little way down the attachment to the inner bottom edge of the mussel shell. Then he took a number of small images of Buddha stamped in tin, upon the under side of which he placed some sticky substance—probably a bit of beeswax—and, after carefully lifting the edge of the mantle he inserted them and used them upon row on the inside of the shell.

All that was necessary now was to return the mussel to the pool, where it would shortly repair the injury done to the edge of the mantle and overcome the irritation produced by the irregular surface of the tin images by coating them with mucus. So after a few months, a year or more, when these mussels were taken from the pool, killed and opened, the images would be found fixed to the inside of the shells just as they were placed, but now nicely coated with shining, pearly nautilus—miraculous manifestations of the Great Buddha, and as such highly prized by devout worshippers.

Original Glee Club

The glee club, which originated in some meetings at the house of Mr. Robert Smith in St. Paul's churchyard (England), commenced in 1783, at which motets, madrigals, glees, canons and catches were sung after dinner. The meetings were subsequently held at Doctor Beevers' and other houses until, in 1787, it was resolved to establish a society to be called the Glee club, the first public meeting of which took place at the Newcastle coffee house on Saturday, December 22, 1787.

First Motor Cycle

The earliest known attempt at a two-wheeled vehicle which would proceed under its own power is said to have been made by W. W. Austin of Winton, Mass., in 1808. It was propelled by a coal-burning steam engine. Other more or less similar affairs followed in 1884 and 1889. In 1895 a cycle propelled by a combustion engine using gasoline was exhibited at Madison Square garden in New York city. This has been called the first appearance of the motor cycle in the form in which it is known today.

As editor of this official organ, Mrs. Lindley feels the pulse of the younger women all over the country who will be the social leaders of their respective communities.

"Girls today are astonishingly serious at heart," she said. "Their nonchalant manner and attitude grows out of their abhorrence of sentimentality rather than a lack of feeling. The key to their behavior is summed up in their own phrasing, 'What is all the shooting about?' But the fact that they hate a fuss over things does not mean that they are indifferent to the home and family things that the women of yesterday stressed so much."

"It is just that the young women of today have a business-like efficiency and matter-of-factness about living. They are practical and not romantic. They insist that their lives be interesting. But I am constantly surprised to find that they are interested also in home things."

"I should say that women's love of home and children has not changed. The method of living merely has."
