TWO MORE TRAINS OF LAMBS BEING SENT CALIFORNIA

Another trainload of lambs left the county yesterday morning, signed to California markets. The trainload consisted of 10 cars, 6 of which were loaded at Roseburg and 4 at Oakland. Another train of larger size is being loaded at these two points again today. The lamb market is holding up except for a slight drop in the price of the ewes. The price of the ewes is about \$1.00 each, it is expected that the total return will be around \$500,000, which, according to sheep men, is practically all clear profit, as the returns from the wool pay the costs of raising the sheep, allowing all the money from the lambs to be counted as profit. Distribution of this large sum of money throughout the county will undoubtedly have a very marked effect.

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FORUM LUNCHEON PROGRAM TODAY IS MOST INTERESTING

The program in connection with today's forum luncheon, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, was one of the most interesting of any of the recent meetings. The program was in charge of the Roseburg Garden Club, and Charles McElhinny, president of the organization, presided. Mrs. Harvey Webb, of Springfield, Missouri, who is visiting in Roseburg, sang two selections in opening the program and closed with another wonderfully fine solo. She was accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Arthur Krauss.

Mrs. G. R. Child, a former professional landscape gardener, made a most interesting talk on home gardens, showing how shrubs should be planted, how gardens should be planned and explaining in brief the English plan of planting. She stated that Oregon's climate is almost identical with that of England and that gardeners should be on the same plan as those in England, which are the most beautiful of any in the world. Oregon, she says, has the advantage of overhead moisture and of dappled skies, that give sturdier brighter plants than can be grown in any other place in the country.

W. S. Carpenter, of the Umpqua National Forest, spoke on foundation planting, touching briefly upon some of the fundamentals in connection with planning gardens and caring for shrubs.

Roscoe Anderson, an attorney of Redding, California, who is on his way home from a trip into Washington, spoke for a few minutes, pleading for closer cooperation between Southern Oregon and Northern California, showing that the interests of these two localities are similar and that by cooperation they can secure great results.

MAN ARRESTED EARLY IN WEEK TAKEN PORTLAND

A man who was arrested early Sunday morning here by City Officer George Dietrich and State Officer R. M. Bennett, was taken to Portland by deputy United States Marshal Tom Ward and lodged in the Multnomah county jail. The man was arrested the first of the week after officers followed him suspecting him of "milking" cars and after he was taken into custody, found that he was driving a stolen car. He has refused to give his name and a charge was filed against him as transporting a stolen car from San Francisco to Roseburg. The fellow was lodged in the city jail after his arrest but had been there only a few minutes when he was discovered to have picked the lock of the door and was preparing to escape. Bonds were fixed at \$2,000 by Justice C. F. Hopkins and the man will await the meeting of the federal grand jury at Portland until his case is heard.

set for convening the morning session another touch of the revival spirit was given the assembling convention by a very dusky chorus of jubilee singers, who took the platform 100 strong and poured out such old plantation spirituals as "De Heat Ob De Day," "Jes' Like John," and a dozen others. Their massed voices filled the huge hall.

The negro singers made every minor chord and plaintive intonation tell where a fifty piece military brass band was all but lost in the general noise. When they had been at it for a half hour they filled off the stage, now filling with distinguished guests.

The convention bands carried on. They did so noisily, beginning with "How Dry I Am," while the crowd laughed and applauded.
