Tears Gash Near Knee—
Mrs. Harry Hatfield, well known local woman, received a painful injury while picking wild blackberries at Little River Wednesday when she tripped on a snag and cut a three-cornered jagged gash below the right knee. The cut was nearly to the bone and bled considerably. Her father, R. L. Matthews, and her sister and Mrs. R. L. Russell were with Mrs. Hatfield and gave first aid. It was necessary for her to lie quiet for a few hours until the bleeding could be stopped. She was afterward brought to Roseburg for medical attention and ten stitches were taken to close the wound.

EX-SUPT. PRISON FLAX PLANT SHOWN REVENGE SEEKER

Robt. Crawford, Ousted at Salem, Caused Holdup Oregon's Product, Is Assertion.

SALEM, June 28.—Mystery surrounding the recent discharge of Robert Crawford from city employment here was explained today when officials charged that Crawford had secretly connived to injure the state flax industry at the penitentiary.
Crawford was formerly employed as superintendent of the industry at the prison, but was three times discharged for cause. It was said at the prison today. He was employed and discharged successively under the administrations of Governors Wilkey, Olen, and Pierce. He again sought employment under the Patterson administration when Henry Meyers was appointed prison superintendent, but Meyers refused to employ him.

Convict Labor Barrier.
About a year ago a shipment of upholstery from the state plant into British Columbia was suddenly stopped after reaching Canada. This puzzled the Oregon officials until informed later by the Canadian customs that the latter had been informed by Crawford that the Oregon tow was processed by prison labor. For the first time, say the Oregon officials, they were informed of a Canadian statute prohibiting the importation of prison-processed materials.
Later railroad officials informed state officials that they had been approached by Crawford who asked about Oregon flax shipments, declaring the flax industry should not be in the prison and that he was going to take measures to get it out.

Letter Exposes Scheme.
Crawford was employed by the city to remember houses in the residence district. Because of his alleged activities against the flax industry prison officials sought his employment by the city. Crawford denied these activities when called to account by the mayor. A little later an English firm that buys Oregon flax products wrote prison officials here, enclosing a letter Crawford had written the firm, containing information similar to that sent the Canadian firm. The date on this letter showed it had been written after he had been called on the carpet by Mayor Livesley.
Because the state's flax market is mainly outside the United States and because of the existence of about \$150,000 worth of contracts between the state and Willamette Valley farmers covering this season's flax crop, Crawford's machinations were considered serious enough to warrant his discharge from the city service. The city engineer discharged Crawford when he was furnished a copy of the letter Crawford wrote the English firm.

BURNS PROVE FATAL.

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 28.—William Morris, 40, died today from burns received when his clothing was ignited by an electric spark as he turned on a switch at the Crown Williamette Mills.

COURTNEY FINISHES FIRST LEG OF HIS ATLANTIC FLIGHT.

Horta, Island of Fayal, Azores, June 28.—Captain Frank T. Courtney completed the first leg of a trans-Atlantic flight this afternoon, arriving at Horta from Lisbon in his Bonnier-Napier "whale" plane after a hop of 1,000 miles.
The twin motored flying boat which also carried E. D. Hosmer, wealthy Canadian backer of the flight, Sergeant Pierce, the mechanic, and Radio Operator Gilmore, landed at 5 o'clock, local time, completing the long hop in eleven hours.

TWO SLAIN, THIRD DYING IN DETROIT RIVER RUM FEUD

DETROIT, June 28.—Warfare between factions fighting for control of the Detroit river liquor traffic broke out last night. August Nykiel and Michael Dipisa, rival leaders were shot dead. A policeman and a woman bystander were in hospitals today suffering wounds received during a pistol battle.
Police were told that Nykiel was called out of one of his string of river front saloons and cut down by a fusillade of pistol shots fired by Dipisa and an unidentified companion, posted behind an automobile in front of the place.
Edward A. McPherson, a constable was serving a summons at a house nearby when the shooting occurred. He ran to the street and opened fire on the pair as they attempted to enter their car. Dipisa was killed during the exchange. McPherson and Mrs. Catherine Krolzyk, a passerby, were wounded. McPherson seemed today to have little chance of recovery. The woman was not seriously wounded.

Markets

PORTLAND, June 28.—Butter values were higher today on local wholesale markets. All grades except firsts advanced, cube extras being a cent higher at 42c and standards and prime firsts a half cent higher at 41c and 40c, respectively. Shipments from Seattle and San Francisco were responsible for the increases.
Egg prices were steady and the market was firm.
Country dressed meats were steady, except for lamb which were drags and showed signs of weakness. Most offerings sold around 20c per pound although a few strictly choice lights brought as high as 22c. Poultry prices were unchanged.

Cherries were decidedly cheaper, bins going mostly around 10c per pound while Royal Annes brought 7c. Other varieties were down as low as 4c per pound. Strawberries were also easier, most sales ranging from \$1.35 to \$2.00 per crate. Loganberries sold around \$1.65, raspberries around \$1.75, blackberries from \$1.75 to \$2.00 and currants at \$1.75 per crate.
Celery from the Lake Labish district was plentiful, selling from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per dozen, depending on size. Shipments to Seattle were going out today.
