FLIERS LOST IN FROZEN NORTH STILL UNFOUND

Shifting Floes and Dense Fog Increase Peril of Missing Parties.

SEARCH IS KEPT UP

Thea Rasche's North Star Crashes in Test Dash—Courtney Takes to Air Again.

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 28.—Fog and shifting ice floes added to the peril of rescue operations today in the effort to relieve the six men now stranded off Northeast Land and to find Captain Roald Amundsen and his five companions lost in the Arctic since June 15.

Neither the Swedish, Finnish nor Italian airplanes were able to take air today because of the thick fog. While the Italian relief expedition was held inoperative by the weather conditions, the search for Amundsen continued fruitlessly.

Rumor Unconfirmed
STOCKHOLM, Sweden, June 28.—Rumors that Dr. Finn Malmgren and his two Italian companions, who left the main Arctic party on May 30 in an effort to reach land on foot had been found, have no confirmation here. No news has been received in Stockholm regarding the report.

The added rumor that the party had a fierce fight with Polar bears may have arisen from the fact that before leaving the Noble group Dr. Malmgren shot a Polar bear, thus supplying the entire party with fresh meat.

Hop Attempt ails
CAPT. D. L. MADELINE, Que., June 28.—Miss Thea Rasche, German girl flier who hopes to make a non-stop flight to Berlin, and her crew escaped uninjured when her monoplane North Star crashed through some bushes on an attempted take-off for a test flight today.

Ulfes Koenemann, pilot, and mechanic Zehner were in the plane with Miss Rasche. The latter was at the controls. The ship was not seriously damaged.

Owing to the softness of the field the plane refused to leave the ground and taxied to the end of the field where it ploughed through some bushes. A full load of 400 gallons of gasoline was carried but was dumped by Koenemann when the plane approached the edge of the field.

Fliers Coming Back
SOUTHAMPTON, England, June 28.—Miss Amelia Earhart, Wilmer Sultz and Louis Gordon, fresh from the cordial welcome given them in Great Britain after their flight across the Atlantic from Newfoundland, sailed for home today.

The group of American fliers was given a hearty greeting by the passengers lining the rails of the steamship President Roosevelt as their tender came alongside.

Miss Earhart was guest of honor at a private dinner given last night by Mrs. Hubert Scott Payne of the Imperial Airways and slipped away from her hotel quietly this morning to join the liner without any official function.

Courtney on Wing
HORTA, Island of Fayal, Azores, June 28.—Captain Frank T. Courtney, British aviator, who hopped off from Lisbon this morning for this place enroute to the United States, sent a wireless message to The Associated Press this afternoon reading: "Still going strong; expect arrive about 4 o'clock."

ROME, June 28.—General Umberto Nobile will return by air to direct the search for the ice-bound crew of the Italia, says a dispatch today in L'Avanti d'Italia.

FREE SWIMMING COURSES WILL START JULY 2

An announcement was received here today that George Hughline, Red Cross swimming instructor, will be in Roseburg on July 2 to spend one week instructing classes in swimming, lifesaving, etc. These classes are free of charge. The Red Cross and Kiwanis club uniting in bearing the expense. Classes will be held for children and for adults, and will accommodate all classes of swimmers.

Lessons will be given persons who are not able to swim at present (while those who are now swimmers will be given advanced instruction) and will be taught lifesaving methods.

It is particularly urged that persons who are not swimmers enroll to swim. There is absolutely no cost attached to the courses, and the classes will be so arranged that they will suit the convenience of the pupils.

Cards for enrollment have been received and are now available at the office of M. C. Church, who is representing the Red Cross in preparing for the swimming course.

HOLLYWOOD STUDIO

SAVED FROM FIRE

AS WIND SHIFTS

(Associated Press Special Wire)
HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 28.—A carelessly tossed cigarette or lighted match, tinder-dry brush and a brisk wind—these were the combination which brought almost a thousand film workers into the real drama of fire fighting near here yesterday.

The film forces were called upon to save the huge plant of the First National Studios at North Hollywood late yesterday from a grass and brush fire which swept 1,000 acres of the nearby hills. To a lesser extent fears were felt for the safety of the Universal Pictures studio at Universal City.

Although the motion picture people and organized fire fighters, who were rushed to the battle which extended over a three mile front, hacked away brush and played streams of water on the lower buildings of the First National movie plant, it was a shift

of the wind which brought victory. The change in the wind turned the flames back against the burned area and the fire was brought under control.

Featured players joined laborers in the battle with the brush fire. Richard Barthelmess, an actor, directed a squad of workers in back firing to cut off the fire.

In the belief that a cigarette tossed away by a motorist was responsible for the starting of the fire, officers ordered a check of all truck drivers who had been using the nearby road. A report also was received that two men had been passing in a small truck and one of them tossed a lighted match into a pile of brush.

Secretary George H. Himes had charge of giving out ribbons bearing the year that the wearer came to Oregon.

Mrs. O. N. Denny, who was a little child at the Whitman mission at the time of the cassabre, was to be crowned "mother queen" this afternoon. Governor

Patterson and Mayor Baker, both native sons of pioneer parents, were on the afternoon program.
