CHICAGO SCHOOLS GO YEAR WITHOUT SUPERINTENDENT

(Associated Press Special Wire) CHICAGO, June 28.—One of the world's largest school systems, that of Chicago, has completed a year's operation without the services of a superintendent. The office was vacated in January, 1927, when the superintendent, John W. Thompson, was elected mayor.

Thompson promised if elected he would remove William McArdrew, superintendent of schools, because the mayor asserted, he was pro-British. McArdrew was suspended shortly after Thompson was installed, and after a trial lasting half the school year, the school board voted that he be dismissed. During the school year the work

of the superintendent has been in the hands of an assistant, but at no time was there an acting superintendent so titled. McArdrew, whose contract expired in January of this year, refused to accept salary during the period of his suspension, so that the city was saved this expense. Suits have been filed by the former superintendent, however, seeking, in one instance, to collect \$250,000 from the mayor for alleged libel.

The superintendent-less year was marked by the largest attendance in the history of Chicago schools and by the largest number of graduates from high schools.
