OS WEST SAFE AS COMMITTEEMAN OF OREGON BOURBONS

Primary Law Prevents His
Ousting—Delegation
Satisfied With
the Platform.

HOUSTON, Tex., June 29.—As
the democratic national conven-
tion entered into what was ex-
pected to be the final day's ses-
sions, indications were seen that
Oswald West would be represented
as Oregon's selection for national
committeeman.

The Oregon delegates, regard-
less of their opinion of West's desir-
ability as Oregon's member of
the national committee, apparently
in most cases had reached the
conclusion that they had no alterna-
tive under the state primary
law but to submit his name to the
convention.

West's stand against the candi-
dacy of Gov. Alfred E. Smith of
New York resulted in the question
of the Oregon man's desirability.
Some delegates today expressed
the opinion that the matter would
not be considered further by the
delegation.

West's name was not reported
when the roll of states was called
in convention for the purpose of
representing state committeemen,
and it was later explained that his
pre-convention attitude toward
Smith's candidacy had rendered
questionable the advisability of
certifying him for the place. West
was quoted by several of the dele-
gation as saying he would resign

from the committee place in event
of Smith's nomination.

The Oregon delegates faced the
final frame of mind after last
night's harmonious session. They
declared themselves pleased with
the platform, although some of
them would prefer a declara-
tion of modification or re-submis-
sion of the prohibition amend-
ments to the people.

They agreed, however, that the
prohibition plank as adopted was
probably the best that could be ob-
tained under the circumstances,
and expressed pleasure that a con-
test over the question on the con-
vention floor had been averted.

MEDFORD, June 29.—Two dam-
age suits against Dr. E. H. Porter
of this city, were filed in circuit
court late yesterday by B. F. San-

of an automobile accident on the
Pacheco Pass highway near Ma-
dara, April 24 last, in which Mrs.
Eleanor Sanders was killed, and

penses, in one suit, and in the other

SALEM DIVORCEE TRIES SUICIDE

EUGENE, June 29.—An at-
tempt at suicide, made by Mrs.
Elietha S. White of Salem, who
shot herself under the heart after
an interview with Earl Lawton
here last night, may be successful.
Mrs. White's condition was ex-
pected at the Pacific Christian
hospital at noon today as "not
good."

She is not expected to live.
The bullet, which punctured the
woman's intestines and spleen,
ranged slightly downward and
emerged from her back just above
the kidneys. It was found in her
nothing.

Mrs. White, divorced wife of El-
mo S. White, president of the Amer-
ican Fidelity Investment com-
pany, had just finished an inter-
view with Lawton, an intimate
friend of several years, when she
sent a bullet crashing into her
body. Lawton was about to board
a train for Sacramento.

ROBINSON ON TICKET WITH SMITH

sonal friends throughout, are to
try conclusions in another arena,
with the presiding officer's chair
in the senate chamber at stake.

Dry and Farm Friend
Robinson is a dry and in his
speech as permanent chairman of
the convention he warned his party
against listening to pleas for a
modification plank in the plat-
form. In the same speech he stated
a tremendous Smith demonstra-
tion quoting Jefferson and the
Constitution in support of reli-
gious equality.

He supported the McNary-Han-
son bill in the last session of
congress and voted to pass it
over President Coolidge's veto.

So overwhelming was the land-
slide to Robinson in the voting to-
day that when his column was ad-
ded at the end of the first ballot, it
totalled more than 900 of the 1100
in the whole convention. Imme-
diately his two nearest rivals,
Senator Barkley of Kentucky, with
77 votes, and Mrs. Nellie Tayloe
Ross, of Wyoming, with 33, with-
drew their names and asked that
the votes given them be credited
to Robinson.

Other changes to the Arkansas
senator came in so rapidly that
the clerks could not keep track of
them and in the end it amounted
virtually to a nomination by ac-
clamation.

Settled Before Dark

SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUS-
TON, Tex., June 29.—A demo-
cratic ticket reading Smith and
Robinson was shaping up today as
the party's national convention
came together for its final ses-
sion.

After a succession of early
morning conferences the sponsors
of such a combination appeared at
the convention hall telling in-
quirers it was all over. Their pre-
dilection was accepted at full
value by a great many of the dele-
gates themselves, although a half
dozen rivals for second place on
the ticket remained in the field.

Balances Ticket

In settling upon Senator Robin-
son, the Arkansas man who was chair-
man of the convention itself as
the vice presidential choice,
those who put him forward argued
that he would balance off the
selection of Gov. Smith of New
York as head of the ticket by giv-
ing it at once a western and
southern flavor.

Robinson's sector of the south-
west may not itself be a fighting
ground in the campaign for it is
consistently democratic but the
senator has many warm friends
and admirers in both south and
west and they are counted on to
help.

Some of the convention man-
agers were predicting that Robin-
son's nomination would be a first
ballot band wagon affair as one
sided as the presidential poll by
which Smith himself was named
last night.

Despite the manifest pick up of
the Robinson movement, support-
ers of other candidates, notably
Senator Barkley of Kentucky, re-
mained active. A Barkley band
paraded through the aisles of the
hall before the session opened and
was cheered by the assembling
delegates.

Almost Unanimous
Senator Bratton of New Mexico
placed the name of Senator Robin-
son formally before the conven-
tion. A crash of applause that
seemed to sweep nine out of ten
delegations greeted the name of
the Arkansan.

Bratton reviewed Senator Robin-
son's career at great length,
praising him for his "rugged hon-
esty," for his sagacity and for the
record of his legislative accom-
plishments. He declared there was
not one objection that could be
urged against him.

At the close of the speech the
Arkansas delegates started a pro-
cession around the hall. Pennsyl-
vania, Washington, North Dakota,
Arizona, Utah, New Mexico, Mon-
tana, Iowa, West Virginia, Ar-
kansas, Georgia, Colorado, Okla-
homa, Illinois, Maine, Massachu-
setts, Mississippi, South Carolina,
Delaware, Nebraska, Michigan,
New Hampshire, Ohio, North Car-
olina, Oregon, Maryland, Texas
and Virginia were among the
states who sent their standards in-
to the parade so closely ranked
that it looked as though the whole
army of delegates had almost come
over en masse to the banner of the
Arkansan.

It was not a very noisy pa-
rade, for the delegates were about
yelled out after the cheering and
demonstrating of the past two
days. But it was impressive
enough in the representative char-
