CONVENTION OF G. A. R. BODIES REACHES AN END

today elected commander of the G. A. R. Department of Oregon and was installed in his new office at ceremonies conducted by the National Commander in Chief, Elbridge L. Hawk, Mr. Clemens, who is a cousin of Mark Twain, is serving his second term as department commander, although this service has not been consecutive. He declined to be a candidate for reelection at the convention last year, but this year a strong campaign was made on his behalf by many of his friends.

He served in four Missouri regiments, his last command being the 3rd Missouri Infantry, Company 4, where he held the rank of first sergeant. He had three years of hard fighting, enlisting in 1862 at the age of 17 years. The Missouri regiments had a great deal of action in putting down the activities of the bushwhackers, and they were kept fighting a large part of the time. Mr. Clemens was wounded and captured in one of these battles. Three older brothers also served in the Civil war.

He came west in 1871 and engaged in farming near Newberg, where the greater part of his life has been spent.

There were also several group banquets held last night, one of the largest being put on by the Daughters of Veterans, who entertained the visiting national officers and department heads.

MEXICAN TROOPS SLAY 31 REBELS

MEXICO, CITY, June 29.—Twenty-six insurgents have been killed and five captured and executed after a three-hour battle at La Mulita, near San Jose Iturbide, state of Guanajuato.

A drumhead court martial preceded the executions.

General Jaime Carrillo, military commandant of Guanajuato, reported to President Calles, that the federal troops under Colonel R. C. Avila located a large group of insurgents concentrated under five leaders at La Mulita. The leaders were Manuel Frias, Florencio Monasterio, Dolores Zarazua, Plonemo Oronio and Jose Rios.

For three hours the federal forces battled against the insurgents before routing them, in their flight the anti-government forces left 26 bodies on the field of combat. Five prisoners were captured and executed and 60 saddled horses were seized.

When the official announcement was made of the New York governor's victory, Mrs. Smith's family broke the restraint that had marked their participation in the convention till that moment, and she and all reached over and kissed the first lady of New York.
