Markets

PORTLAND, June 29.—Reflecting strength of outside butter markets local quotations were higher today. Advances of a cent on cube standards and prime firsts to 42 cents and 41 cents, respectively, and of a half cent on firsts to

401 cents, were made at the session of the Dairy Exchange late yesterday. Print butter was a cent higher today in sympathy with the rise in the price of standard cubes.
Butterfat was also quoted higher this morning, local creameries offering 16 cents a pound delivered in Portland, 43 cents at station and 41 cents on track, at country points.
Egg prices were unchanged today but trading was active and the market tone firm. The first shipment of eggs direct from this market to Peru was slated to go out today. Local commission men look for steady movement of eggs to Peru hereafter as Pacific coast points hold an advantage over New York in freight rates.
Pork was higher on the country dressed market this morning, best light hogs fetching 15¢/15½¢. Veal was also in excellent demand but prices were not notably higher. Lamb continued drab. Poultry prices were steady and unchanged.

Eggs, poultry, potatoes, onions, wool, nuts, hay, escarola bark, hops—steady, unchanged.
Livestock prices unchanged.

CONQUEROR OF BOBBY JONES IN NATIONAL OPEN



Johnny Farrell didn't cry with joy when he beat Bobby Jones by one stroke in the play-off round of 36 holes and won the national open golf championship but the boy who carried his clubs around the Chicago course for four hard and dry days did let go with the tears. Little Harold Holtz (on the right above) was so overcome with emotion when his hero sunk a long putt on the last green and won the title that he couldn't do a thing but sprinkle some tears among his freckles and admit that he felt great to be a champion's right hand man.

At the left is a closeup of the young New York professional, who with a ten-foot putt on the last green, won the national open golf championship. Jones and Farrell tied with a 294 each in 72 holes and in the play off Farrell turned in a 143 to 144 for Jones. The title has an estimated value of more than \$50,000 a year to a professional. In addition to the national title, Farrell won a \$1500 prize for being the best dressed golfer in the tournament.

"The happiness and welfare of millions of men, women and children who constitute the nation was the great driving force behind the doctrine enunciated by the immortal Jefferson, given life by him and carried through by Cleveland and Wilson.

For Lighter Taxes.
"I am convinced that our platform voices that doctrine. I stand committed to the platform and will welcome an opportunity to reorganize and make more efficient the agencies of government to the end that the burden of taxation may be lightened.

"Our platform lays at rest the absurd claim insidiously put out by republican propaganda that the republican party has a monopoly upon the mechanics of prosperity. Our platform in its tariff and financial policy gives assurance to every legitimate business

man, wage earner, farmer and taxpayer that prosperity will not be conserved but fairly distributed among all.
Planks Approved.
"The definite declaration of the convention to aid agriculture and the planks dealing with labor problems are sound, progressive and sincere as is also the party commitment to the development of our waterpower without alienating our God-given resources. Our plank on foreign policy states the simple truth that the Divine command to 'love thy neighbor as thy self' contains no limitation and was intended to apply as between nations.
"The equal and even enforcement of law is the cornerstone upon which rests the whole structure of democratic government. If it is the will of the people of the United States that I am to take an oath as president of the United States to protect and defend our constitution and laws, I will execute that oath to the limit of my ability without reservation or evasion.
Wants "Sane" Linger Law.
"It is well known that I believe that there should be fundamental changes in the present provisions for the national prohibition law based as I stated in my Jackson day letter on the fearless application of the problem of the principles of Jeffersonian democracy. While I

fully appreciate that these changes can only be made by the people themselves through their elected legislative representatives, I feel it to be the duty of the chosen leader of the people to point the way which in his opinion leads to a sane, sensible solution of a condition which I am convinced is entirely unsatisfactory to the great mass of our people.

"Common honesty compels us to admit that corruption of law enforcement officials, bootlegging and lawlessness are now prevalent throughout this country. I am satisfied that without returning to the old evils that grew from the saloon, which ears ago I held and still hold, was and ought always to be a defunct institution in this country, by the application of the democratic principles of local self government and states rights, we can secure real temperance, respect for law and eradication of the existing evils.

"In my formal acceptance of your nomination I shall give to the people of the country my views in full upon all of the issues of the campaign. In the way that I know that you can do it, give the delegates my warmest thanks for the confidence they have reposed in me and my assurance that with their support I confidently expect to lead the historic democratic party to victory in November."
